September 9, 2019 Hearing:

Property owner, Allan Middendorf, stated this parcel was once the old Sports Page bar that he purchased and demolished. He wants to sell the property and Applicant, SLD Enterprises (Steve Dill—owner) desires to purchase the property to construct a building in which to move its current truck sales from the Grizzly Stadium parking lot to this location. Applicant, Steven Dill testified that he would like to construct a building with a showroom and attached garage area in which to sell used commercial trucks, golf carts, and trailers. He would like to have possibly up to 100 vehicles on site, with 4 employees. There will be no mechanical work, oil changes, body work or painting to be done on site. Only minor repairs—broken mirrors, windows, batteries, and other small non-mechanical items, will be done on site. Trailers will not be larger than 14,000 lbs. and custom golf carts. The property will be fenced with security lighting on the lot. Customer parking will be asphalted, and the vehicle storage lot will be rocked. Hours of the facility will be 9-5 p.m., Monday – Friday; Saturday by appointment only. Signage would be 10' x 20'. The location has public water and public sewer.

The property is immediately adjacent to Interstate 255.

Adjacent residential home owner, Cynthia Covington, purchased her property five years ago. She is opposed to the business and believes property values will decease because of this business. She is concerned with the lighting of the property, theft and damage drawn to this area because of this business, doesn't care for chain link fences, and does not think the property lines are correct.

Applicant indicated he is willing to install a vinyl fence and shrubbery in between his property and Ms. Covington's property.

County Board Member June Chartrand has concerns with the proposal and being able to park 100 vehicles on this property. She requested the Zoning Board members view this property.

The matter was continued until 11/4/19 to allow the Zoning Board members to view the property.

November 4, 2019 Hearing:

Applicant, Steve Dill of SLD Enterprises, indicated that he will not be open on Sunday as per the Secretary of State rules and regulations. He again indicated he has no problem installing a vinyl fence and shrubbery along the southern property line between the property and the adjacent residence. He stated the building he plans to construct has a 30' x 30' showroom and a 45' x 60' bay area. Again, there will be no service/mechanical work (engine repair, oil changes, painting, etc.) done on the premises.

Cindy Hood (Covington) again testified that she is opposed to the request. She restated the same objections as voiced at the September hearing. However, she did state that if the Special Use is allowed, she would a request a vinyl fence, entirely paved lot, and down lighting.

Partricia Thompson testified that she is against the request, and questioned the easements on the property, and presented old surveys and plats contesting property lines.

Dennis Phelps, neighboring property owner, testified he was against the request and gave a history of his parcel of property.

Debbie Schmidt testified against the request and questioned the repair work to be done on site.

County Board Member June Chartrand stated that she was against the request.

Zoning Board members discussed the fact that the property is zoned HB, the commercial uses to the south (Weber Chevrolet) and north of the property. The planned new interchange just north of the property and immediate proximity to Interstate 255.

Witnesses having been sworn, testimony and evidence presented, and the Zoning Board of Appeals being fully advised in the premises, and the Board having considered the following in conjunction therewith, and found:

- (1) Whether the proposed design, location, development and operation of the proposed Special Use will adequately protect the public health, safety, and welfare and the physical environment. The Board found as follows: That based upon review of the area in question, testimony and evidence submitted, the zoning of the property, and proposed commercial uses in the area, the proposed Special Use would not be injurious to the public's health, safety, and welfare and the physical environment.
- (2) Whether the proposed Special Use is consistent with the County's comprehensive plan. The Board found as follows: The proposed Special Use while not consistent with the County's Comprehensive Plan, will not negatively affect the same, because the property has not been utilized for agricultural purposes in decades, the property was previously used for business/commercial purposes (a bar), is immediately adjacent to Interstate 255, and the trend of development in the area is more business/commercial than agricultural.
- (3) The effect the proposed Special Use may have on the value of the neighboring property and on the County's overall tax base.

 The Board found as follows: The proposed Special Use will not negatively impact the value of neighboring property and will likely have a positive impact on the County's overall tax base.
- (4) The availability and the effect the proposed Special Use would have on the public utilities and on traffic circulation on nearby streets. The Board found as follows: The proposed Special Use is expected to have little to no impact on public utilities or on traffic circulation.

- (5) Whether there are any facilities near the proposed Special Use (such as schools or hospitals) that require special consideration. The Board found as follows: There are no schools or hospitals in close proximity to the proposed Special Use that require special consideration.
- (6) Whether the proposed Special Use is compatible to adjacent uses and uses in the general vicinity. The Board found as follows: The proposed Special Use would not negatively affect the character of the neighboring properties or their respective uses, given certain special conditions.
- (7) The time period for which the Special Use Permit should be granted or any special requirements for certification of continued compliance with the terms of approval. The Board found as follows: The Applicant will install an 8 ft vinyl fence with shrubbery to screen the building, lot and use from the southern adjacent residence, i.e., the entire southern property line of the Special Use shall contain such fencing and shrubbery, excepting any portion in any public right-of-way. All lighting shall be down facing so as not to cast light onto neighboring properties. The facility shall be developed pursuant to plans submitted, subject to aforementioned special requirements.

A motion was made by M. Deitz to *GRANT* the proposed Special Use request based upon the above and subject to the stated conditions. The motion was seconded by K. Heberer. Testimony:

Adam Karr presented the case on behalf of the Applicant. He explained that the Applicant is installing a self-service laundromat facility in an existing building on the subject property, and that the Applicant would like to partition the building to have an area separate from the laundromat in which liquor and/or alcoholic beverages may be sold by the drink in order to install video gaming. He explained that while people wait on their laundry there is approximately 45 minutes of downtime in which they have nothing to do. He stated that they could go over to the next room and engage in video gaming. The Applicant stated that this is not a bar and they don't plan on having liquor, only beer and wine. Also, the Applicant will serve miscellaneous snacks (pizza, chips, etc.).

The Applicant intends to remodel the existing building with new plumbing, heating, cooling, flooring, painting, and updated lighting. The building will be laid out as per the site plan submitted by the Applicant. The facility will have a full time attendant on duty. The Applicant expects to employ 3-5 employees (one per shift during the hours of operation). The hours of operation are as follows: 8:00 a.m. to midnight Monday through Saturday, and noon to midnight on Sundays. The Applicant will add landscaping, exterior lighting to the front of the building and the parking lot. The parking lot will have 18 spaces.

In addition, he explained that there will be one common entrance to the building, however, inside the entrance way there will be separate doors—one to laundromat area and another to the lounge area. Access to the lounge area is to those persons 21 and older. There will be monitored security in both areas of the facility and security cameras outside of the building as well.

John Galle of Winners Choice Gaming testified in support of the Applicant. He explained that Winners Choice Gaming would supply the video gaming machines for this facility and provided testimony on similar gaming facilities in the State of Illinois.

Katie Karr (wife of co-owner of Phase II) testified in support of the Applicant.

Cynthia Chambers (neighboring property owner) inquired into who monitors alcohol consumption on site and if there was an issue with traffic due to the fire department building being located in close proximity to the subject property. Mr. Ross and his wife purchased property at 4394 Mascoutah Ave., Belleville, IL at a foreclosure sale and they have been cleaning up the property since they purchased it. The property was an abandoned car dealership with abandoned vehicles located on it and dilapidated structures. The owners have demolished most structures and are waiting to dispose of the cars once they receive junk titles to the same.

The Applicant's business is emergency water restoration, structure dry outs, mold remediation services, fire restoration services and odor removal. The large majority of the Applicant's business occurs off-site at the structure affected. However, the Applicant receives rugs to clean at its place of business. As part of the Applicant's business it utilizes pickup trucks, vans, box trucks and trailers.

The Applicant will build a new metal building with a brick wainscoting on the office part. Employees and customers will enter the property off of Keck Road and not Mascoutah Avenue. Part of the property will have greenspace and the Applicant plans to cooperate with Shiloh Valley Township to clean the ditch area along Keck Road to allow for better drainage from the north.

Applicant's hours of operation are 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday thru Friday, appointment only on Saturday, and closed on Sundays. However, the Applicant provides emergency services 24/7.

The Applicant explained the rug cleaning operation conducted on the premises, the amount of water used, the non-toxic chemicals used, and the process in general.

This Ordinance shall take full effect on January 1, 2020, and remain in effect and operation until lawfully repealed or superseded by the St. Clair County Board. The passage of this Ordinance shall be filed with the Clerk of St. Clair County on the date of Approval and Adoption, with publication of its passage by the County Clerk as provided by law.

SUBJECT: CYBER LIABILITY AND NETWORK SECURITY COVERAGE PROPOSAL

JANUARY 1, 2020 TO DECEMBER 31, 2020

Lockton is pleased to present St. Clair County, IL ("SCC") with an option to purchase Cyber Liability and Network Security coverage ("Cyber"). SCC currently does not purchase Cyber coverage.

Cyber coverage is intended to insure SCC for 1st Party and 3rd Party costs arising from a claim resulting from the following events:

1st Party Costs

- Breach Response Costs: Legal costs, forensic costs, mandatory notifications costs, voluntary
 notification costs, call center costs, credit monitoring and / or identity monitoring, public relations,
 and crisis management costs.
- Cyber Extortion: Reasonable and necessary expenses incurred as a result of a ransom demand due to the threatened release of personally identifiable information ("PII") as a result of a breach of a computer system; and / or reasonable and necessary expenses incurred to prevent or end an attack against a computer system.
- Network Business Interruption: Loss of net income and extra expenses as a result of a security failure of the insured's computer systems.
- Data Restoration: Costs to restore or replace destroyed data as a result of a security failure of the insured's computer systems.
- Reputational Harm: Loss of net income as a result of clients deciding to no longer do business with the insured following a cyber event where data is lost or stolen; components of reputational harm coverage can be found within business interruption insuring agreements.
- Cyber Crime: Theft of money, securities, or other property due to a cyber incident or social engineering scheme.

3rd Party Costs


- Network Security Liability: Claim expenses and damages emanating from network and nonnetwork security breaches.
- **Privacy Liability:** Claim expenses and damages emanating from violation of a privacy tort, law, or regulation.
- Privacy Regulatory Proceedings and Fines: Claim expenses in connection with a privacy regulatory
 inquiry, investigation, or proceeding; damages/fines, Consumer Redress Fund; Privacy regulations
 fines and penalties.

- Payment Card Industry Data Security Standards Liability: Fines, penalties, and assessments that
 are incurred as a result of a breach of contract with a card brand or payment processor; Assessments
 can include fraud assessments, card reissuance costs, etc.
- Media Liability: Claim expenses and damages emanating from personal injury torts and intellectual
 property infringement (except patent infringement); Claim expenses and damages emanating from
 electronic publishing (website)

Benchmarking and Loss Estimates

Data suggests that a majority of US Public Entities, of similar size to SCC, are either uninsured or underinsured and when coverage is purchased, are purchasing limits of < \$5M.

80% of SCC's peers that purchase cyber coverage, purchase limits of \$5M or less. Loss estimates for a breach event run between \$7.6M and \$8.6M; which would suggest that SCC's peers are underinsured at benchmark; vis a vis, SCC would be underinsured at limits of < \$5M.



For reference, the \$7.6M loss estimate is based on 52,000 compromised records and the \$8.6M loss estimate is based on 208,000 compromised records. With 262,000 (or so) SCC residents, a full breach would exceed these estimates. Additionally, given the amount of PII that SCC has in addition to its residents PII (civil court + criminal court + etc.) SCC has a robust amount of PII.

Recommendation

The Cyber program structure, limits, and pricing options are included on the next page.

I think one could argue for Option 2, the \$10M limit, given the benchmark and loss estimates reviewed in tandem. If you consider the expense on a price per million basis, Option 1, the \$5M option, is \$3,500 per mil and the \$5M excess option (Option 2: \$10M of total limits) is \$2,275 per mil. That written, you currently have nil and going to \$5M would be a step in the right direction.

I am admittedly a bit conservative when it comes to retaining risk; so perhaps think of it this way:

• The data (benchmarking and loss estimates) suggests \$5M is low and the potential for loss is > than \$5M, is the assurance of \$10M in coverage worth the extra \$22,750 in expense?

I believe that it is and would recommend the \$10M limit, based on the benchmarking, the loss estimate, the amount of PII exposed at the County, experience with other cyber liability claims, and an admitted slant towards conservative risk taking.

Whereas, the St. Clair County Board finds that it is in the best interests of the County to conform its Video Gaming Ordinance with the relevant and current provisions of the Illinois Gaming Act; and

Whereas, the County Board of St. Clair County finds that in order to establish and codify laws relating to the above issues, the County will amend and revise Chapter 8 (Business Regulations), Article VIII (Video Gaming) of its Revised Code of Ordinances.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNTY BOARD OF ST. CLAIR COUNTY, ILLINOIS THAT:

SECTION I: Amendment. Chapter 8, "Business Regulations", Article VIII, is hereby AMENDED to include provisions which shall read as follows:

SEE Exhibit "A" ATTACHED HERETO.

SECTION II: INCONSISTENT ORDINANCES REPEALED. All ordinances or parts of other Ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance shall, to the extent of the conflict, be, and are hereby repealed, provided that nothing herein shall in any way excuse or prevent prosecution of any previous existing violation of any Ordinance superseded hereby.

SECTION III: SAVING CLAUSE. Nothing in this Ordinance hereby adopted shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding pending in any court, or any rights acquired, or liability incurred, or any cause or causes of action acquired or existing, under any act or ordinance hereby repealed by this Ordinance, nor shall any just or legal right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired, or affected by the Ordinance.

<u>SECTION IV: PASSAGE AND PUBLICATION</u>. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from its passage of publication by the County Clerk as provided by law and shall continue in effect and operation until lawfully repealed by the St. Clair County Board.

EXHIBIT "A"

ARTICLE VIII - VIDEO GAMING

- 8-8-3 Registration Required. No person shall own, possess, keep or display for use or patronage by the public within the unincorporated area of St. Clair County, any video gaming terminal without having first registered said terminal in the St. Clair County Clerk's Office in a manner consistent with this ordinance. It shall be a prerequisite to any potential registration that the person have a valid license issued by the State of Illinois for each video gaming terminal. The loss or suspension of any license issued by the State of Illinois for such video gaming terminal(s) shall automatically result in the invalidation of the registration of the terminal(s) that are the subject of the license issued by the State of Illinois. There exists no right of reimbursement of any registration fees paid pursuant to this ordinance in instance of license revocation by the State of Illinois.
- 8-8-4 Registration Fee. The yearly registration fee per video gaming terminal shall be Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) or the maximum amount allowed by the laws of the State of Illinois for each video gaming terminal upon a premises, up to the maximum number of video gaming terminals per licensed premises allowed by the laws of the State of Illinois. (See 230 ILCS 40/65.) The license fee shall not be prorated.
- **8-8-5** Registration Application. Registration application shall be made upon the prescribed registration application adopted by the St. Clair County Clerk.
- 8-8-6 <u>Time of Application and Term of Registration.</u> Applications for registration pursuant to this Article shall be submitted at least thirty (30) days prior to commencement of the period for which the registration is sought. The term of the registration under this Article shall commence on the date on which the registration is approved, and shall expire on December 31st of the same year in which the license is issued, unless otherwise invalidated earlier pursuant to (i) this Article, (ii) for violation of the St. Clair County Liquor Code (21-1-1, et. seq.), (iii) violation of the Illinois Video Gaming Act (230 ILCS 40/1, et. seq.), or (iv) violation of any other applicable code, regulation, or law. Application for registration and payment of fees must be made annually.
- **8-8-7** Registration Not Transferable. No registration approved pursuant to this ordinance shall be transferable to any other person not named in the registration application.
- **8-8-8 Number of Devices Allowed.** The number of video game terminal devices registered and operating at State of Illinois licensed establishment at any one time shall not exceed the number authorized in the license issued for said premises by the State of Illinois.

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PREAMBLE

This Agreement is entered into by and between the County of St. Clair, Illinois (CENCOM) (herein referred to as the "Employer") and the Illinois Fraternal Order of Police Labor Council representing CENCOM Telecommunicators and Calltakers (hereinafter referred to as the "Union").

It is the intent and purpose of the parties to this Agreement to set forth herein their entire agreement covering rates of pay, wages, hours of employment, and other conditions of employment; to achieve and maintain harmonious relations between the Employer and the Union; and to provide for the prompt and fair settlement of grievances without any interruption of, or other interference with, the operation of St. Clair County CENCOM.

It is the Employer's and Union's desire to provide the people of St. Clair County, Illinois, with the highest quality service by mutual agreement through good faith negotiations.

ARTICLE 1 - RECOGNITION

Section 1.01

The Employer recognizes the Union as the sole and exclusive collective bargaining representative for the purpose of establishing wages, hours, and other conditions of employment of all employees in the bargaining unit. The bargaining unit shall include: all full-time Telecommunicators and Calltakers employed by the County of St. Clair (CENCOM) as certified by the Illinois State Labor Relations Board in Case No. S-RC-06-086. All other positions shall be EXCLUDED from the above described bargaining unit as well as any others excluded by the Illinois Public Labor Relations Act, 1984; P.A. 83-1012; 5 ILCS 315/1 (et al.).

Section 1.02

Pursuant to applicable statutory mandates and the Rules, Regulations and Procedures of St. Clair County CENCOM employees hired must serve an initial probationary period. Such probationary employees are covered by the terms and conditions of this Agreement, except that the Employer may discipline or discharge a probationary employee at will. The probationary period commences on the date the employee is hired and ends after twelve (12) months.

For training purposes, employees shall reimburse Employer 75% of provable training costs if they voluntarily cease employment within one year; 50% if within two years; and 25% if within three years.

ARTICLE 2 - MANAGEMENT RIGHTS

Section 2.01

The Union recognizes that the Employer possesses the sole and exclusive right to operate and direct St. Clair County CENCOM, in all aspects, including, but not limited to, all rights and authority granted by law unless otherwise expressly stated in or limited by this Collective Bargaining Agreement. Except as otherwise expressly stated herein, St. Clair County policies are not to be considered a part of this Agreement.

Management rights, subject to this Collective Bargaining Agreement, include, but are not limited to, the right:

- a. To maintain executive management and administrative control of CENCOM and its properties and facilities and the staff;
- b. To plan, direct, control, assign and determine the operations or services to be conducted by CENCOM and its employees;
- c. To determine the methods, processes, means, job classifications and number of personnel by which the Employer's operations are to be conducted;
- d. To select, hire, promote, schedule, train, transfer, assign and evaluate work, of bargaining unit employees;
- e. To direct and supervise the entire working force of the Department, including the establishment of work standards;
- f. To demote, suspend, discipline or discharge employees for just cause;
- g. To make, add, delete, alter and enforce procedures, rules and regulations;
- h. To introduce new or improved methods, equipment or facilities;
- i. To contract out for goods and services.

The County has the sole authority to determine the purpose and mission of the St. Clair County CENCOM and the amount of budget to be adopted thereto.

Section 2.02 - Civil-Emergency Conditions

If, at the sole discretion of the Employer, it is determined that extreme civil-emergency conditions exist, including but not limited to riots, civil disorders, tornado conditions, floods, or other similar catastrophes, upon oral notice to a Union representative at a practical time, the provisions of this Agreement may be suspended by the Employer during the time of the emergency, provided wage rates and all economic benefits shall not be suspended and that the provisions of this Section shall neither limit an employee's right to invoke the grievance procedure in a timely manner after the cessation of the emergency, nor limit the protections granted by Sections 14.01 (Internal Investigation) and 14.03 (Indemnification) of this Agreement. It is agreed that the processing of any grievance occurring during this emergency shall be delayed until a time when the emergency conditions no longer hamper normal business activity.

ARTICLE 3 - GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE

Section 3.01 - Definition

A grievance is defined as a dispute or difference of opinion between an employee or group of employees (with respect to a single common issue) covered by this Agreement, or the Union on behalf of the employee(s), and the Employer with respect to the meaning, interpretation or application of an express provision or provisions of this Agreement as written which involves, as to the grievant, an alleged violation of an express provision of this Agreement. The Union may file a grievance directly at Step 3 if there is no single immediate supervisor or division administrator common to all the employees affected by the grievance. An employee may grieve discipline imposed by the Employer through the grievance process outlined in this collective bargaining agreement.

Nothing contained herein will be construed as limiting the right of any employee having a grievance to discuss the matter informally with any appropriate supervisor, and having the grievance adjusted without intervention of the Union, provided the adjustment is not inconsistent with the terms and meaning of this Agreement.

Section 3.02 - General Rules

- 1. Unless a grievance is filed in a timely manner, it shall be deemed waived. Unless a grievance decision is appealed within the designated time limits, it shall be deemed resolved at the last response.
- 2. Any and all grievances must be filed in writing on a form identical to that attached hereto as Appendix "A". All appeals and responses to the grievance shall be recorded thereupon and/or made with attachments thereto.
- 3. Time limits may be extended by agreement of the parties at the respective step in the procedure. However, such extension shall be in writing.
- 4. When a grievance is filed, it shall to the extent practicable, name the employee(s) involved, set forth the nature of the grievance, identify the facts upon which it is based and the provision(s) of the Agreement allegedly violated, state the contention of the employee with respect to said provision(s), indicate the relief requested and be signed and dated by one or more of the employees affected or by a Union representative. Responses to the grievance shall be made to the first employee who signed the grievance.

Section 3.03 - Procedure for Filing Grievances

A grievance shall be processed and resolved in the following manner. Grievances shall not be processed unless filed within the specified time period. Before filing a grievance, an attempt should be made to resolve the matter informally with an immediate supervisor.

<u>Step 1 - Division Director</u> If the matter is not resolved informally, the grievance shall be filed in writing with the Division Director within five days of receiving notice that the attempt to informally resolve the grievance was not successful.

Upon receipt of the properly filed written appeal, the Division Director may meet with the employee to review the grievance. Within five (5) business days of the receipt of the Step 1 appeal, the Director will render a decision in writing to the employee.

Step 2 - Arbitration If the grievance is not resolved as a result of Step 1, the Union may request in writing, within ten (10) business days after the Step 1 response, or within ten (10) business days after the Step 1 response was due, that the grievance be submitted to binding arbitration. The request by the Union must be made within ten (10) business days of completion of the last appropriate step. In the event the Union requests arbitration, the parties shall jointly request the FMCS to supply a list of seven (7) arbitrators. Nothing herein shall preclude the parties from meeting at any time after the list of arbitrators has been requested and prior to the convening of the hearing in a further attempt to resolve the dispute.

The parties may contact one another concerning selection of an arbitrator within ten (10) business days after receipt of the list from FMCS. However, either party may reject one (1) entire list before any selection is indicated by either party. Both the Employer and the Union shall have the right to strike three (3) names from the list. Each party shall alternately strike a name from the list, with a coin toss determining who strikes the first name, the other party striking the second name, and so on, until one name is remaining from the list. The person whose name remains unstricken from the list shall be the arbitrator.

Once the arbitrator has been selected, the parties shall notify him/her in writing requesting that a hearing be held at the earliest date(s) upon which the parties can agree. The parties may attach a copy of this Article and any other relevant portions of this Agreement to the notification sent to the arbitrator. Once an agreed date is appointed, the parties may arrange for the services of a court reporter for the arbitration hearing.

Each party shall bear the expenses and fees of its representatives and witnesses. The parties shall share equally the expenses and fees of the arbitrator, a transcript for the arbitrator, the court reporter, if both parties requested a court reporter, and the hearing room, if any. Unless otherwise agreed, the hearing shall be held in St. Clair County. The arbitration hearing shall be closed to the public and the press. Each party shall be responsible for the cost of purchasing its own copy of the written transcript.

Section 3.04 - Authority of the Arbitrator

The arbitrator shall have no right to amend, modify, nullify, ignore, add to nor subtract from the provisions of this Agreement. The arbitrator shall consider and decide only the question of fact as to whether there has been a violation, misinterpretation or misapplication of the specific provisions of this Agreement as submitted to him/her by the parties and shall have no authority to make a decision on any issue not so submitted to him/her. The arbitrator shall have the power to frame the issue raised by the grievance if the parties are unable to agree to the issue(s). The arbitrator shall be without power to make decisions contrary to or inconsistent with applicable federal or state law. The arbitrator shall submit his decision in writing within thirty (30) days following the close of the hearing or the submission of briefs by the parties, whichever is later, unless the parties agree, to an extension thereof. The decision shall be based solely upon the arbitrator's interpretation of the meaning or application of the specific terms of this Agreement to the facts of the grievance presented, consistent with applicable law. The arbitrator shall have the authority to fashion an award consistent with the requested remedy. A decision rendered consistent with the terms of this Agreement shall be final and binding. Arbitration does not include interest arbitration.

Section 3.05 - Time Limits

No grievance shall be processed unless it is submitted in a timely manner pursuant to Section 3.03, Step 1. If a grievance is not presented within the time limits set forth above, it shall be considered waived. If a grievance is not appealed to the next step within the specified time limit or any agreed extension thereof, it shall be considered settled on the basis of the Employer's last answer. If the Employer fails to answer a grievance or an appeal thereof within the specified time limits, the employee or the Union may elect to treat the grievance as denied at that step and immediately appeal the grievance to the next step. The time limits in each step may be extended by written agreement of the Employer and the employee or Union representative.

In computing time limits under this Article, the first business day of a time limit shall be the first business day on which the employee worked from the date of the first occurrence which had application to that employee or of which the employee knew, or the business day on which the grievance is filed or appealed, or the business day on which a response, to be prescribed by a particular step, is given or is due to be given by the Employer. The last business day of a time limit shall be deemed to end on 5:00 p.m. on that business day.

For the purposes of this Agreement, "business" day shall be defined as a day on which the St. Clair County Building is open for regular business to the public, Monday through Friday, from the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. local time, excluding holidays as defined in Article 6, Section 6.01, of this Agreement.

Section 3.06 - Representation

An employee or the Union or the Union's representative may present a grievance personally at Step 1 of this procedure. During any step of the procedure the employee may be represented by the Union. Grievance settlements shall be reduced to writing and signed by the Employer and the grievant(s).

ARTICLE 4 - HOURS AND OVERTIME

Section 4.01 - Work Period

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Hours of Work: The Employer and Union agree that the Employer shall retain the right to establish the scheduled workday. At no time will an employee be regularly scheduled to work consecutive shifts. The Employer may not split an employee's shift.

The normal work period for employees covered by this Agreement shall be defined as eighty (80) hours in a fourteen (14) day work period beginning on a Sunday, for those employees working twelve (12) hour shifts, and forty (40) hours per week, starting on Sunday for those employees working an eight (8) hour shift.

The Employer shall retain the right to make a change in the scheduling during the term of this Agreement with sixty (60) days notice to the Union and the employees, however, the sixty (60) days notice does not apply to manpower issues or needs to temporarily fill shift.

Overtime compensation shall be given in accordance with the Fair Labor Standards Act. Hours worked in excess of the above defined work periods shall be compensated at the premium compensation rate.

The Employer will allow employees to trade shifts within the same pay period where practicable, as long as prior notice is provided as per current practice.

Section 4.02 - Compensatory Time

Employer has option to pay compensatory time by cash payment or with time off.

Section 4.03 - Call Back

A call-back is an official assignment of work that does not continuously precede or follow an employee's regularly scheduled work hours. Employees reporting back to work on a call-back shall be compensated for a minimum of two hours, regardless of actual time worked, at the overtime rate of pay or be compensated for actual hours worked if more than two hours at the overtime rate of pay.

Section 4.04 - Work Schedule

When an employee attends a training session during the time that the employee is not scheduled to work, the employee's time in attendance including lunch and travel to-and-from will be compensated at the appropriate rate of pay.

When an employee attends a training session during the time that the employee is not scheduled to work, but nonetheless on a day on which the employee is scheduled to work, the employee's time in attendance, lunch period and travel to-and-from will be compensated at the appropriate rate of pay. At the Employer's discretion, the employee's work schedule may be altered to ensure the safety of the employee and others is not compromised due to the potential for fatigue, however it may not be altered solely to avoid payment of overtime. If the employee's schedule is altered, the employee will be given the opportunity to use compensatory time to replace the hours lost scheduling.

When the Employer must compensate for travel for training, the calculation shall be based upon MapQuest.

If an employee drives their personal vehicle to and from any training, they shall be paid mileage at the then current rate established by the Internal Revenue Service. Commute time and mileage to off-site training will be compensated for reimbursement purposes at the appropriate rate.

ARTICLE 5 - SENIORITY

Section 5.01 - Definition of Seniority

Departmental Seniority shall, for the purpose of this Agreement, be defined as an employee's length of continuous full-time service within the Employer's Department since his/her last date of hire, less any adjustments due to layoff, approved leaves of absence, excluding military leave, suspensions or other breaks in continuous service. Departmental seniority shall be used as the basis for computation of vacation.

Classification Seniority shall, for the purpose of this Agreement, be defined as an employee's length of continuous service within a classification from date of appointment to that classification; less any adjustments due to layoff, approved leaves of absence, excluding military leave, suspensions or other breaks in continuous service. Classification seniority shall only be used as the basis for selection of annual vacations and other approved time off if more than one employee has submitted a dated written request for the same time off.

If an employee is promoted out of the bargaining unit(s) and then returns, the employee will not receive any classification seniority credit for the time spent in the promoted position, but will retain the classification seniority credit for the time originally spent in the bargaining unit.

Section 5.02 - Termination of Seniority

Seniority and the employment relationship shall be terminated when an employee:

- a. quits, or
- b. is discharged, or
- c. retires or is retired, or
- d. is laid off and fails to report to work within fourteen (14) business days after having been recalled, or
- e. is laid off for more than one (1) calendar year without being recalled.

Section 5.03 - Seniority List

The Union shall prepare a list setting forth the present Departmental Seniority dates and Classification Seniority dates for all employees covered by this Agreement which shall become effective on or after the date of execution of this Agreement.

Section 5.04 - Layoffs

Should the Employer find it necessary to lay off employees, it shall be done on the basis of Job Classification seniority: that is, the person with the least seniority shall be the first to be laid off. Any employee being laid off will receive a written notice at least ten (10) business days prior to its effective date.

ARTICLE 6 - HOLIDAYS

Section 6.01 - Number of Holidays

The following shall be considered holidays for eligible regular full-time employees:

New Year's Day

Veteran's Day

Martin Luther King's Birthday General Election Day in November

President's Day (even-numbered years only)

Spring Holiday Thanksgiving Day

Memorial Day Thanksgiving Friday

Independence Day Christmas Eve

Labor Day Christmas Day

Employees working a seven-day/twenty-four hour a day schedule shall observe holidays on their actual calendar dates. Employee working a five-day/eight-hour/weekends off/business schedule shall observe the holidays on the dates designated by the St. Clair County Board.

Section 6.02 - Holiday Pay Credit

- A. Worked Holiday An employee required to work on an observed holiday, in addition to his/her regular day's pay, shall be credited for the holiday at the additional rate of time and one-half (1-1/2) for that holiday shift. Such credited hours shall be paid to the appropriate employees with the first payroll check issued following the holiday.
- **B.** Un-worked Holiday An employee who is not scheduled to work on an observed holiday will be compensated at the regular straight-time rate for twelve (12) hours. Such credited hours shall be paid to the appropriate employees with the first payroll check issued following the holiday.

Section 6.03 - Holiday During Prior Approved Time Off

In the event a holiday occurs when an employee is on prior approved time off, such holiday shall be credited to the employee in accordance with Section 6.02 B, above.

If an employee calls in sick the day before or day after a holiday, the employee shall not be entitled to holiday pay unless on the first day back to work, the employee submits a doctor's excuse to the Employer, signed by the doctor.

Employees will not normally be allowed to schedule days off on the following dates: December 31, January 1, July 4, and December 24 and 25, unless the Employer agrees to make an exception. However, employees shall be able to trade shifts on these dates in accordance the process set forth in Section 4.01.

ARTICLE 7 - VACATION

Section 7.01 - Eligibility

All regular, full-time employees shall earn vacation time. Employees shall be eligible to take paid vacation after one year's continuous employment with the Employer.

If an employee resigns he/she will receive vacation credit prorated for that portion of the year, of employment which he/she worked (e.g., if an employee would have earned 80 hours of

vacation leave during a year in which he/she resigns, and works one-half of the year of employment before giving his/her two-week notice, he/she will receive 40 hours of vacation leave compensation).

Section 7.02 - Accrual

Eligible employees shall earn vacation time in accordance with the following schedule:

- a. from the date of hire until completion of five (5) years of continuous service: eighty (80) hours per year;
- b. from the completion of five (5) years of continuous service: one hundred twenty (120) hours per year.
- c. from completion of twelve (12) years of continuous service: one hundred sixty (160) hours per year.

Section 7.03 - Vacation Scheduling

On or before December 1 of each year, the Employer shall post a vacation sign-up sheet for each shift. Employees shall select vacation leave in one work week increments, said increments being from 6:00 a.m. Monday to 6:00 a.m. the Monday immediately following, to be taken during the upcoming calendar year. The number of employees permitted off duty at any time shall be determined by Management. During the first thirty (30) calendar days the sign-up sheet is posted, classification seniority, as defined in Section 5.01, shall be used to determine who is entitled to a particular week or weeks of leave. After said 30-day period, vacations shall be scheduled on a first-come, first-served basis, and classification seniority shall not be used to determine who is entitled to a particular week for vacation leave, except for requests for the same time periods submitted on the same day.

A master list of all approved vacation time for the year shall be posted on the FOP bulletin board.

Section 7.04 - Carry-over

Employees shall be permitted to carry over from one anniversary year of continuous service to the next up to one continuous service years' worth of vacation leave (e.g., if the employee is accumulating vacation leave at the rate of 80 hours for each completed year of continuous service, that employee may carry over no more than 80 hours of vacation leave from one anniversary year to the next). The foregoing may be carried over without filing any written

request to do so. For purposes of this Section, anniversary year is defined as beginning with the last hire date of an employee, less any adjustments, until the employee completes one full calendar year of continuous service, and any calendar year thereafter during which the employee is employed on a continuous, full-time basis.

At no time shall more than one continuous service years' worth of vacation be carried over from one anniversary year to the next without permission of the Employer, except in those cases when scheduled vacation-leave time was refused or cancelled by the Employer, and the employee cannot be rescheduled at a time mutually agreeable to the Employer and the employee. In the aforesaid case when a leave has been so cancelled or refused, said cancelled or refused time shall be allowed to be carried over in addition to the maximum accumulated amount referenced in the paragraph immediately above.

In the event of a dispute regarding earned or accrued vacation leave, the Employer shall upon request of a union representative produce within a reasonable time information relating to the employee's earned and/or accrued vacation leave.

ARTICLE 8 - SICK LEAVE

Section 8.01 - Amount

All regular, full-time employees shall accumulate 5.33 hours of sick leave for each month's service. Sick leave may be used for illness, non-duty related disability or injury of the employee or employee's immediate family member who is dependent upon the employee.

Section 8.02 - Carry-over

Employees shall be able to carry over from one year to another a maximum of two hundred eighty-eight (288) accumulated sick-leave hours.

Section 8.03 - Posting

In the event of a dispute regarding earned or accrued sick leave, the Employer shall upon request of a union representative produce within a reasonable time information relating to the employee's earned and/or accrued sick leave.

Section 8.04 - Notification

Failure to notify Employer may result in termination.

Section 8.05 - Ill at Work

<u>Illness or Injury at Work:</u> Any employee who is ill or injured on the job shall immediately notify the supervisor.

For employees on either a seven and one-half hour or eight-hour work schedule, if an employee becomes ill while at work after the first two hours of work, the employee shall lose ½ day of accumulated sick time. For employees on a twelve-hour work schedule, if an employee becomes ill at work after the first three hours of work, the employee shall lose ½ day of accumulated sick time.

Section 8.06 - Verification of Sick Leave by a Physician

In order to continue active work assignments or to resume work after an illness or injury or disability, employees must provide the department with a written physician's statement releasing employee to assume activities within their position responsibility if:

- 1. Upon returning to work after prolonged illness of four consecutive days or more;
- 2. Upon returning to work from an extended leave of absence;
- 3. After the employee has a potentially disabling illness, injury or condition; or
- 4. Upon returning to work after a diagnosed communicable disease.

Section 8.07 - Extended Illness/Recovery with No Accumulated Sick Time

If an employee exhausts all accumulated sick-leave time and requests sick leave due to an extended illness or recovery from a non-duty related injury, permission may be granted by the Employer for the employee to use other accumulated time for sick leave. Permission to use other accumulated time (i.e., vacation, holiday or compensatory time) must be requested by the employee at least forty-eight (48) hours in advance and is subject to the approval of the Employer.

For the purposes of this Agreement, extended illness or recovery shall be defined as one that requires one calendar month or longer for recovery. Should an employee request sick-leave time in excess of that accumulated by him/her, the Employer may require the employee to provide verification of recovery time by a physician.

If a 48-hour advance request is not made, or if the employee has no accumulated compensatory time, holiday time or vacation leave, time off taken by the employee due to illness or recovery from injury shall not be compensated for by the Employer. In addition, no vacation, sick leave, holiday or other benefits shall be credited to the employee during such extended illness or recovery.

For the purpose of the Family Medical Leave Act, an employee is eligible for a leave of absence through the Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993. In order to be eligible for leave, an employee must have worked for the Employer at least twelve months and must have worked at least 1,250 hours over the previous twelve months prior to the leave. Eligible female and male employees are allowed up to twelve weeks of leave per twelve month period following the birth of a child, the placement of a child for adoption or foster care, or the serious health condition of the employee or an immediate family member (defined for purposes of this Family and Medical Leave Act situation as including the employee's child, spouse or parent). The leave for birth or placement must take place within twelve months of the birth or placement of the child. The employee's leave shall be unpaid. The Employer may require the use of accumulated sick leave and/or vacation leave or the employee may, upon approval of the Employer, use accumulated sick leave and/or vacation leave. Sick leave can be used only to the extent that it would otherwise be available. It would otherwise be available pursuant to Section 9(B) of this Code, which regulates the use of sick leave. During the leave, St. Clair County shall continue to provide coverage under its group health plan, with the employee continuing to pay his or her regular health insurance contributions. Following return upon leave, the employee shall be returned to a position with equivalent pay, benefits and other terms and conditions of employment.

Any accumulated sick leave, vacation leave and/or short term or long term disability leave used by the employee for the birth of a child, placement of a child, or a serious health condition of the employee or of an immediate family member shall be considered taken for purposes of the Family and Medical Leave Act. Any time off due to injury or illness on the job or at work shall also be considered taken for purposes of the Family and Medical Leave Act. If an employee takes more than three (3) consecutive days of leave due to an illness, the employee shall be considered to have a serious health condition, and all leave taken shall be considered

taken for the purposes of the Family and Medical Leave Act starting with the first day the employee missed work.

Requests shall be made through the Personnel Department on the forms provided.

Section 8.08 - On-Duty Injury

Employees injured while on duty are covered by applicable provisions of Illinois law. Employees injured while on duty shall file a Loss-Control Report with the Loss-Control Employee of the Department.

Section 8.09 - Sick Leave Taken in Excess of that Accumulated

If any employee knowingly takes sick leave in excess of that accumulated by him/her and is inadvertently compensated by the Employer for said leave, then the Employer shall have the right to deduct an amount equal to the amount of compensation awarded erroneously from any future compensation due the employee. If any employee knowingly takes sick leave in excess of that accumulated by him/her, the employee may be subject to discipline.

Section 8.10 - Sick Leave Incentive Pay

The total number of hours in the bank may not exceed those allowable for IMRF retirement purposes.

Employees who do not use a sick day from January 1 through June 30 shall receive a personal day. Employees who do not use a sick day from July 1 through December 31 shall receive a personal day as well. All such personal days shall be used within six months of accrual, or they shall be lost.

ARTICLE 9 - LEAVE OF ABSENCE

Section 9.01

The Employer may grant a leave of absence without pay to employees for periods not to exceed six (6) months, and such leaves may be extended for good cause for an additional six (6) month period with the approval of the County Board. A written request must be submitted to include a statement of the employee's intended use of the leave and the date he/she shall return from leave.

Section 9.02

No vacation, sick leave, holiday or other benefits shall accrue during a leave of absence. Further, no seniority shall accrue during a leave of absence of one month or longer. Compensation of benefits for accrued vacation or sick leave will not be granted during a leave of absence. The Employer may require substantiation of any leave of absence or any request for a leave of absence.

Section 9.025

Military leave shall be pursuant to state and federal law.

Section 9.03 - Funeral Leaves

In the event of the death of a member of the employee's immediate family (mother, father, mother-in-law, father-in-law, spouse, child, brother, sister, or grandparent), a leave of absence will be granted to the employee from the day of death through the day of the funeral, but at no time will this be more than three (3) days. The employee may use sick time or vacation time for such leave.

ARTICLE 10 - CLOTHING/MAINTENANCE ALLOWANCES

Section 10.01 - Allowances

The Employer shall be responsible for the cost of the initial issue of any mandatory uniform and equipment changes, in addition to any standard issue of uniforms and equipment as currently provided by this Article. The Employer shall provide three short sleeve uniform tops and three long sleeve uniform tops to the first ten (10) employees who request the same in writing from their supervisor after the beginning of each calendar year (January 1, 12:00 AM).

ARTICLE 11 - HEALTH, WELFARE AND RETIREMENT PLANS

Section 11.01

Employer agrees to provide health, welfare and pension plans consistent with the county-wide fringe benefit package. Employee contributions toward the cost of the benefit package will be consistent with county-wide policies and practices. The Employer shall have discretion to change carriers as it determines appropriate.

Any changes in benefits that are consistent with this collective bargaining agreement and county-wide policies and practices will not be subject to impact bargaining during the term of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 12 - COUNTY RESIDENCY REQUIRED

All probationary employees shall reside in St. Clair County by the end of their probationary period, and all employees who are past probationary period or who do not go through probation shall also reside in St. Clair County, Illinois within six months of date of hire. Any employee who is so required to establish residency in St. Clair County, Illinois, and who does not so reside within St. Clair County, shall be terminated from employment.

The County Board Chair has the authority to extend by six additional months the time in which the employee must establish residency in St. Clair County, Illinois. In the case of probationary employees who are granted an extension of six additional months, the period of probation also extends the six additional months.

In the case of non-probationary employees, further extensions may be granted depending on the County's need.

ARTICLE 13 - GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 13.01 - Review of Records

Upon prior written approval of the Employer, the Union or a representative shall have the right to examine time sheets and other records pertaining to the computation of compensation of any employee covered by this Agreement whose pay is in dispute, or any other records of the employee pertaining to a specific grievance, at reasonable times with the employee's written consent.

Section 13.02 - Bulletin Boards

The Employer shall provide the Union with designated space on available bulletin boards, or provide bulletin boards on a reasonable basis, where none are available for purposes of the Union.

Section 13.03 - Definitions

For the purpose of this Agreement, the following definitions shall apply:

EMPLOYEE shall mean a bargaining-unit employee covered by the terms of this Agreement.

REGULAR, as used to describe an employee or job position, shall be defined as non-probationary.

Section 13.04 - Shift Leaders

The Employer shall post notice of its intent to designate eight shift leaders from the bargaining unit. Employees shall be allowed to submit written indications of interest. The Employer shall interview interested employees and then designate which employees shall serve as Shift Leaders. All Shift Leaders shall receive an additional \$0.36/hr. for all hours henceforth in paid status. No employee shall be able to grieve their removal from the assignment of Shift Leader, which shall be at the Employer's discretion.

ARTICLE 14 - EMPLOYEES' RIGHTS

Section 14.01 - Internal Investigation

The Employer agrees to provide at least seventy-two (72) hours prior notice for any disciplinary interview or pre-disciplinary interview/meeting, unless an emergency situation exists. Employees may be represented by a Labor Council representative at any such meeting when requested by an employee. A reasonable time period will be provided in order for such representation to arrive.

Section 14.02 - Personnel Files

Personnel files shall be maintained pursuant to Illinois Personnel Record Review Act.

Section 14.03 - Indemnification

According to State law.

ARTICLE 15 - SAVINGS PROVISION-PARTIAL INVALIDITY

Section 15.01 - Savings Provision

None of the foregoing shall be construed as requiring either party to do anything inconsistent with federal or state law, or local ordinance or the final order or judgment of any court having jurisdiction over the parties.

Section 15.02 - Partial Invalidity

If any provision of this Agreement should be rendered or declared invalid and unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction or by reason of any existing or subsequently enacted legislation, the remaining parts or portions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect and the parties agree to meet within fourteen (14) calendar days to negotiate alternative language to substitute for the invalidated provision.

ARTICLE 16 - COMPLETE AGREEMENT

Section 16.01

The parties acknowledge that during the negotiations which preceded this Agreement, each had the unlimited right and opportunity to make demands and proposals with respect to any subject or matter not removed by law from the area of collective bargaining. The understandings and agreements arrived at by the parties after the exercise of that right and opportunity are set forth in this Agreement and it constitutes the complete and entire Agreement between the parties.

ARTICLE 17 - LABOR-MANAGEMENT CONFERENCES

Section 17.01 - Advance Request

The Union and the Employer mutually agree that in the interest of efficient management and harmonious employee relations, it is desirable that meetings be held between Union representatives and responsible administrative representatives of the Employer. Such meetings may be requested at least seven (7) days in advance by either party by placing in writing a request to the other for a "labor-management conference" and expressly providing the agenda for such meetings. Such meetings, agenda and locations shall be by mutual consent.

When an issue of employee or workplace safety is the topic of discussion, the parties agree to waive the seven (7) day notice period and address the subject at the earliest possible time. It is further understood that complaints of unsafe working conditions shall be filed with the reporting employee's supervisor, with copies forwarded to the division commander and the Employer, as soon as possible after the event giving rise to the complaint.

Section 17.02 - Exclusive of Grievances

It is expressly understood and agreed that such meetings shall be exclusive of the grievance procedure. Grievances being processed under the grievance procedure shall not be considered at "labor-management conferences", nor shall negotiations for the purpose of altering any or all of the terms of this Agreement be carried on at such meetings.

ARTICLE 18 - DUES DEDUCTION

Section 18.01 - Dues Deduction

Upon receipt of a written and signed authorization form from an employee, a copy of which is attached hereto as Appendix B, the Employer shall deduct the amount of Union dues and initiation fee, if any, set forth in such form and any authorized increases therein, and shall remit such deductions monthly to the Illinois Fraternal Order of Police Labor Council at the address designated by the Union in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois. The Union shall advise the Employer of any increases in dues, in writing, at least thirty (30) days prior to its effective date.

Section 18.02 - Dues

With respect to any employee on whose behalf the Employer receives written authorization in a form agreed upon by the Union and the Employer, the Employer shall deduct from the wages of the employee the dues and/or financial obligation uniformly required and shall forward the full amount to the Union by the tenth (10th) day of the month following the month in which the deductions are made. The amounts deducted shall be in accordance with the schedule to be submitted to the Employer by the Union. Authorization for such deduction shall be irrevocable unless revoked by written notice to the Employer and the Union.

Section 18.03 - Indemnity

The Union hereby indemnifies and agrees to save the Employer harmless against any and all claims, demands, judgments, suits or other forms of liability that may arise out of, or by reason of, any action taken by the Employer for the purpose of complying with the provisions of this Article.

ARTICLE 19 - DURATION

Section 19.01 - Term of Agreement

This Agreement shall be effective from January 1, 2019 and shall remain in full force and effect until December 31, 2021. It shall continue in effect from year to year thereafter unless notice of termination is given in writing by certified mail by either party no earlier than one hundred twenty (120) days and not later than sixty (60) days preceding expiration. The notices referred to shall be considered to have been given as of the date shown on the postmark. Written notice may be tendered in person, in which case the date of notice shall be the written date of receipt.

Section 19.02 - Continuing Effect

Notwithstanding any provision of this Article or Agreement to the contrary, this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect after any expiration date while negotiations or resolution of impasse procedures are continuing for a new Agreement, or part thereof, between the parties.

Section 19.03 - Notifications by Certified Mail

All notices provided for in this Agreement shall be served upon the other party by certified mail, return receipt requested.

ARTICLE 20 - DRUG FREE WORKPLACE

All employees, as a condition of employment, will comply with the St. Clair County Drug Free Workplace Policy, attached to this Agreement as Appendix C and D. The administration of the Employer's drug policy shall be as outlined in the Employee Handbook as of the signing of this Agreement; however, this in no way constitutes a waiver of the Employer's

obligation to abide by the principles of corrective and progressive discipline, where applicable; nor does the Union waive its right to appeal any such discipline via the grievance/arbitration process set forth in Article 3. Appropriate levels of discipline will be determined based on the unique facts and circumstances that each separate case presents.

Shift Leader Compensation

All employees designated as Shift Leaders shall be paid an additional \$0.36/hr. for all hours in paid status, in compensation for their additional assigned duties.

APPENDIX C - ST. CLAIR COUNTY DRUG FREE WORKPLACE POLICY

PHILOSOPHY

Drug abuse affects all aspects of our lives - it threatens the workplace as well as the home, the school, and the community. St. Clair County must take a firm stance against illicit drug use. The use of drugs, which term for the purposes of this policy shall include alcohol in the workplace, is unacceptable since it can adversely affect health, safety, and productivity, as well as public confidence and trust. When drug use and/or involvement interferes with an employee's efficient and safe performance of work responsibilities and/or reduces the employee's dependability and accountability, it creates a problem for the whole organization.

Drug abuse inflicts notable human expense. Personal tragedies, feelings of anxiety and depression, and diminishing coping skills are reflected on an individual level. Dysfunctional and strained relationships mark the heavy burden felt by the families of the drug and alcohol abuser.

The cost of drug abuse, both on a personal and organizational level, is unacceptable. The rising incidence in substance abuse makes it imperative that St. Clair County combat this issue by implementing a zero tolerance policy of drug use in the workplace.

DRUG FREE WORKPLACE STATEMENT

The unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a controlled substance, including cannabis, is prohibited in the workplace. Controlled substance means a controlled substance as defined in the Illinois Controlled Substances Act or cannabis as defined in the Cannabis Control Act. Disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal can be taken against employees for drug violations.

All employees will, as a condition of employment:

- 1. Agree not to manufacture, distribute, dispense, or possess controlled substances or alcohol in the workplace.
- 2. Notify their respective Elected official/Department Head of any arrest or conviction of any local, state or federal criminal drug statute no later than twenty-four (24) hours after such arrest or conviction.
- 3. Abide by the conditions set forth in this statement.

VIOLATIONS

- 1. Employees are subject to discipline, including discharge for violation of the above policy.
- 2. Require the satisfactory participation and completion of a State licensed drug rehabilitation program, as sanctioned by the employer.
- 3. St. Clair County will notify the appropriate State Agency from which grant funds were received of the employee's conviction within ten (10) days after receiving notice from an employee of any criminal drug statute conviction for a violation in the workplace.

EMPLOYEE ASSISTANCE

Referral information for behavioral health and substance abuse treatment services is available by contacting the Mental Health Board at 277-6022.

EDUCATION

St. Clair County will provide educational information to all employees regarding the dangers of drug abuse in the workplace.

ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS

There is no requirement by the employer to keep an employee on active employment status who is receiving rehabilitative treatment if it is determined that the employee's current use of drugs prevents the individual from performing work related duties or whose continuance on active status could constitute a threat to the property and/or safety of others. The employee shall pay for all costs of rehabilitation. The employee may use accumulated paid leave, or take unpaid leave pending treatment, at the discretion of the employer, and so long as the employee advised the Elected Official/Department Head of use or abuse of drugs prior to occurrence of reasonable suspicion.

By signing this disclaimer, the employee understands that the employment relationship between the employee and St. Clair County is NOT contractual in nature; that employment can be terminated at the will of St. Clair County, that all employment policies are subject to change without notice and/or approval of the employee; and that any and all discipline and/or discharge procedures contained in the Personnel Code are merely illustrative in nature, and are not meant to be the sole or exclusive manner in which discipline and/or discharge could occur.

The employee further understands that all employees covered through the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department Merit Commission are exempt from this Code as to hiring, promotion, discipline, or dismissal, but are otherwise covered by this Code.

I have been given a copy of the St. Clair County Personnel Code, originally adopted February 25. 1991, revised by the County Board on November 25, 2002, and effective December 1, 2002, and revised by the County Board on September 24, 2007, and effective October 1, 2007.

I understand that contained within the Personnel Code is the St. Clair Drug Free Workplace Policy and St. Clair County Sexual Harassment Policy. I have read and understood the St. Clair County Drug Free Workplace Policy. I have read and understood the St. Clair County Sexual Harassment Policy and agree to abide by its terms and conditions.

WHEREAS, on March 25, 2013, the County of St. Clair passed Resolution 1889-13-R, authorizing the sale of Highway Revenue Bonds, Series 2013, to fund several projects, one of which was Sec. 13-00301-15-PW; and,

WHEREAS, during the preparation of the plans for Sec. 13-00301-15-PW it was determined that an existing 16 inch diameter water main, owned by Illinois American Water Company (IAWC), would need to be relocated and that 44% of the actual costs to perform said relocation would be the responsibility of St. Clair County; and,

WHEREAS, and estimate of these costs was prepared by IAWC, a copy of which is attached for reference; and,

WHEREAS, to keep these costs separate of the costs directly related to the roadway widening a separate section, Sec. 19-00301-20-MS, was assigned to the water main relocation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that there is hereby appropriated the sum of Three Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$350,000.00) from the County's Highway Revenue Bonds, Series 2013, for the construction of this improvement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County of St. Clair agrees to pass a supplemental resolution to provide the necessary funds for its share of the cost of the relocation if the amount appropriated herein proves to be insufficient to cover said cost; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Clerk is hereby directed to transmit two (2) certified copies of this resolution to the Illinois Department of Transportation, through its Region Five Engineer's office in Collinsville, IL.

ORDINANCE 19-1232

WHEREAS, by authority granted by Section 15-316 of the "Illinois Vehicle Code", the County Board has authority, by ordinance, to prohibit the operation of vehicles upon any County Highway under its jurisdiction or impose restrictions as to weights of vehicles to be operated on such County Highways for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days in any one calendar year, whenever such County Highways, by reason of deterioration, rain, snow or other climatic conditions will be seriously damaged or destroyed unless the use of vehicles thereon is prohibited or the permissive weights thereof reduced; and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid conditions are likely to exist from time to time during the period January 15, 2020 to April 15, 2020.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, that effective January 15, 2020 and continuing to April 15, 2020, all vehicles whose gross weight results in an axle load of more than 5 tons are prohibited upon the several County Highways of St. Clair County during this period, not exceeding ninety (90) days, provided that the County Engineer shall cause to be erected and maintained signs designating the provisions of this Ordinance at each end of any highway that requires the invoking of the terms of this Ordinance to prevent it being seriously damaged or destroyed; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the County Engineer shall maintain in his office at all times, for public inspection, a map showing the County Highways or sections thereof, on which such weight restrictions are being invoked; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that this Ordinance be officially known as Ordinance 2020A, and shall be on file at all times in the Office of the County Engineer for public inspection.



In the event plans or surveys are found to be in error during construction of the SECTION and revisions of the plans or survey corrections are necessary, the ENGINEER agrees that he will perform such work without expense to the LA, even though final payment has been received by him. He shall give immediate attention to these changes so there will be a minimum delay to the Contractor.
5.	That basic survey notes and sketches, charts, computations and other data prepared or obtained by the ENGINEER pursuant to this AGREEMENT will be made available, upon request, to the LA or the DEPARTMENT without cost and without restriction or limitations as to their use.
6.	That all plans and other documents furnished by the ENGINEER pursuant to this AGREEMENT will be endorsed by him and will show his professional seal where such is required by law.

 - a. Upon completion of detailed plans, special provisions, proposals and estimate of cost being the work required by paragraphs 1a through 1g under THE ENGINEER AGREES to the satisfaction of the LA and their approval by the DEPARTMENT, 90 percent of the total fee due under this AGREEMENT based on the approved estimate of cost.
 - b. Upon award of the contract for the improvement by the LA and its approval by the DEPARTMENT, 100 percent of the total fee due under the AGREEMENT based on the awarded contract cost, less any amounts paid under "a" above.

By Mutual agreement, partial payments, not to exceed 90 percent of the amount earned, may be made from time to time as the work progresses.

- 4. That should the improvement be abandoned at any time after the ENGINEER has performed any part of the services provided for in paragraphs 1a through 1l and prior to the completion of such services, the LA shall reimburse the ENGINEER for his actual costs plus 200 percent incurred up to the time that he is notified in writing of such abandonment "actual cost" being defined as in paragraph 2 of THE LA AGREES. according to the rates shown on the attached Exhibit A in effect at the time that the work is abandoned.
- 5. That should the LA require changes in any of the detailed plans, specifications or estimates, except for those required pursuant to paragraph 4 of THE ENGINEER AGREES, after they have been approved by the DEPARTMENT, the LA will pay the ENGINEER for such changes on the basis of actual cost plus 200 percent to cover profit, overhead, and readiness to serve "actual cost" being defined as in paragraph 2 of THE LA AGREES. according to the rates shown on the attached Exhibit A in effect at the time that the changes are made. It is understood that "changes" as used in this paragraph shall in no way relieve the ENGINEER of his responsibility to prepare a complete and adequate set of plans and specifications.

It is Mutually Agreed,

- That any difference between the ENGINEER and the LA concerning their interpretation of the provisions of this
 Agreement shall be referred to a committee of disinterested parties consisting of one member appointed by the
 ENGINEER, one member appointed by the LA and a third member appointed by the two other members for disposition
 and that the committee's decision shall be final.
- 2. This AGREEMENT may be terminated by the LA upon giving notice in writing to the ENGINEER at his last known post office address. Upon such termination, the ENGINEER shall cause to be delivered to the LA all surveys, permits, agreements, preliminary bridge design & hydraulic report, drawings, specifications, partial and completed estimates and data, if any from traffic studies and soil survey and subsurface investigations with the understanding that all such material becomes the property of the LA. The ENGINEER shall be paid for any services completed and any services partially completed in accordance with Section 4 of THE LA AGREES.
- 3. That if the contract for construction has not been awarded one year after the acceptance of the plans by the LA and their approval by the DEPARTMENT, the LA will pay the ENGINEER the balance of the engineering fee due to make 100 percent of the total fees due under this AGREEMENT, based on the estimate of cost as prepared by the ENGINEER and approved by the LA and the DEPARTMENT.
- 4. That the ENGINEER warrants that he/she has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide and that he / she has not paid or agreed to pay any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the ENGINEER, any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gifts or any other consideration, contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this contract. For Breach or violation of this warranty the LA shall have the right to annul this contract without liability.




