A RESOLUTION APPROVING SOUTHWEST (IL) REGIONAL PORT DISTRICT'S INCLUSION IN THE PORT OF ST. LOUIS METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREA AS DETERMINED BY THE POLITICAL BOUNDARIES OF TWO PUBLIC PORT DISTRICTS AND THREE PUBLIC PORT AUTHORITIES.

WHEREAS, Southwest (IL) Regional Port District ("Port") is a municipal corporation and body politic organized and existing pursuant to its enabling legislation, 70 ILCS 1860/1 et seq.; and

WHEREAS, the operators of the Port utilize its harbors for the purpose of transferring and moving commodities by river barges; and

WHEREAS, data related to the movement of commodities is reported for each river terminal in the United States; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) published Engineering Pamphlet 1130-2-520, stating that the Navigation Data Center (NDC) is responsible for collecting, processing, distributing and archiving commercial vessel trip and cargo data; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the citizens of Southwest (IL) Regional Port District to have its tonnage data included and reported as part of the historic Port of Metropolitan St. Louis consisting of Southwest (IL) Regional Port District, America's Central Port District, Jefferson County Port Authority, St. Louis Port Authority and a portion of St. Louis County Port Authority from Upper Mississippi River Mile 208 to River Mile 138.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the St. Clair County Board that (1) Southwest (IL) Regional Port District desires to have its cargo and tonnage data reported by the Waterborne Commerce Statistics Center as part of the Port of Metropolitan St. Louis Statistical Area; and (2)That the Director of Economic Development is authorized to undertake all aspects of work associated with the establishment of the Port of Metropolitan St. Louis Statistical Area and the Port's inclusion thereto.

03/02/2020: Applicant, Paul Langendorf presented the application/request. He stated that he would like to change the zoning on his parcels, as well as contiguous parcels (which the owners have agreed to/they are under contract for purchase with Applicant if the rezoning is approved) from B-2 to I-2, due to his current auto parts business growing and the need to be rezoned to I-2 in order to store vehicle shells on his property. He desires to store vehicle shells on his property as he runs an auto parts recycling business. The majority of his customers are on-line customers or auto body/repair shops that he currently delivers to via his own driver. He explained in detail how parts are salvaged from a vehicle, cataloged, listed for sale, stored and shipped when purchased. He also explained in detail how vehicles are broken down on his lot to their shells. He explained that his business is not a junk yard but an auto recycling business, which there is a great need for, and basically his business is internet-based.

Applicant further explained his current auto business has been on this property for 39 years. His current business and the auto recycling business is operated during the week only. There is no heavy equipment, and no change in traffic will occur. He stated his business will complement the area.

There was discussion regarding the wetland area/flood area the Applicant has filled in on his property regarding IDNR concerns, as well as U.S. Army Corp. of Engineers.

The following neighboring property owners appeared to testify in opposition to the application: Patricia Estes McCray, Georgia Shaw, and Lucille Jones. Testimony was received from all three concerning the filling in of low areas/wetlands by the Applicant, dust, water run-off, flooding, noise, and overall, not in favor of an I-2 zoning.

County Board Member Marty Crawford stated that he had concerns and was not in support of the request.

Further discussion was had by the Zoning Board regarding Applicant's testimony, and the testimony of those persons objecting.

The matter was continued by the Zoning Board to consider the testimony, evidence and allow the Applicant to provide additional information regarding IDNR, flooding, and to speak with the surrounding property owners.

08/03/2020: Applicant, Paul Langendorf appeared and further presented the application/request. He further explained issues with IDNR, how an auto parts recycling business is operated, and the specifics regarding his planned business, including but not limited recycling area, parking spots, and customers. He also presented four (4) pages of signatures (with no addresses) of persons in support of the rezoning.

Objectors Georgia Shaw, Patricia McCray, and Lucille Jones appeared and testified against the request, voicing the same grounds as they did at the hearing on March 2, 2020.

Further, discussion was had between the Zoning Board, the Applicant, and the Objectors.

County Board Member June Chartrand attended telephonically.

Witnesses having been sworn, testimony and evidence presented, and the Zoning Board of Appeals being fully advised in the premises, and the Board having considered the following in conjunction therewith, and found:

(1) The existing use of the subject properties and the area is more in-line with an I-2 zoning. The subject property has in the past been used for commercial-type purposes, including industrial type purposes, and currently the subject property is being utilized for an auto repair shop, with storage of vehicles, as well as the recycling of auto parts.

(2) There is a mixed use of other lots in the vicinity of this property. Numerous parcels around the subject parcels, both up and down State Route 163, are utilized for used auto sales, auto repair facilities, auto part facilities and

auto salvage.

(3) The subject properties can be used for B-2 purposes, however, the trend in the area is to a heavier type industrial

use.

A RESOLUTION GRANTING A REQUEST FOR A SPECIAL USE PERMIT BY LAIDLAW WASTE SYSTEMS (BELLEVILLE), INC., OWNERS AND AES BELLEVILLE SOLAR, LLC, APPLICANTS, FOR PROPERTY LOCATED AT 2381 PARK ROAD, BELLEVILLE, ILLINOIS, IN ST. CLAIR TOWNSHIP. (CASE 2020-04-SP)

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held in the County Board Room, 5th Floor, St. Clair County Building, #10 Public Square, Belleville, Illinois, on August 10, 2020 at 7:00 P.M., before the Zoning Board and notice of said hearing was duly given; and,

WHEREAS, on August 10, 2020 the Zoning Board of Appeals after hearing the testimony and evidence presented; after considering all relevant sections of the St. Clair County Zoning Code, and after further consideration of the matter, granted the applicant a Special Use Permit to allow a 12.856 MW DC /9.9 MW AC Solar Farm Energy System in an "A" Agricultural Industry Zone District based on the following:

1. The land in question is located in an "A" Agricultural Industry Zone District, is rural in nature, is adjacent to other farm fields to the north, south, and west, and has a wooded and lake buffer to the east that abuts an outdoor dirt go-kart track. The wooded buffer also runs the length of the northern property line, in which the north-west corner of the subject parcel abuts outdoor soccer fields. There are no residential structures in close proximity to the proposed Special Use. Further, the facility will be located on the cap of a closed landfill.

2. AES Belleville Solar, LLC, as owner and operator of the facility, is requesting a special use permit to construct a 13.286 MW DC/9.9 MW AC solar facility on a footprint of approximately 55 acres of the 107-acre parcel in question. Construction will likely begin in the Fall of 2020 with a 6-8 month construction timeline.

3. It is anticipated that the proposed facility will supply enough energy to meet the demands of approximately 2,167 homes annually.

4. The project will include typical photovoltaic panels on a fixed tilt ballasted racking system, with cable trays and transforms.

5. Once the project has been constructed there will be no added traffic on a daily basis. The only additional traffic will be for periodic inspection and maintenance.

- 6. The entire perimeter of the project site will be fenced by the existing chain link fence. Additional signage regarding the solar facility will be added.
- 7. There will be one access point off Park Road (current access point) to access the solar array, which shall be gated with appropriate signage and emergency access box.
- 8. The proposed setbacks of the project area shall meet or exceed the County's requirements, and the facility shall be installed per the plans submitted.
- 9. The LESA score for the site is 92, which is a low value for agricultural retention. The facility will be located on a closed landfill, and no portion of the subject parcel is located in a Special Flood Hazard Area as defined by the Federal Emergency Management Agency.
- 10. The Applicant further agrees to provide a decommissioning plan as determined and approved by the County before a building permit will be issued.

The Board found and concluded as follows:

- 1. The proposed design, location, development, and the operation of the proposed Solar Farm Energy System, as limited by this motion, adequately protects the public's health, safety and welfare, and physical environment; there is limited access to the site; the site currently has environmental buffers in place (trees and lakes); there will be a thorough decommissioning plan with financing in place for the decommissioning of the facility; the site will be fenced; there will be coordination with emergency personnel; the site due to it being a closed landfill will continuously be monitored and subject to IEPA rules and regulations; and the site will be appropriately maintained.
- 2. The proposed Special Use as limited by this motion, will not have an adverse impact on the County's Comprehensive Plan, as the proposed special use is one considered in an Agricultural Industry Zoning District.
- 3. The proposed Special Use will have a similar impact as the current use of the property, in that the solar facility will make no more appreciable noise and will be appropriately screened and fenced. Further, the Board, when previously considering special use permits for similar solar farm energy systems, received general studies regarding the impact or lack thereof, of such solar developments on neighboring property values. While the Board recognizes a possible impact, the testimony and evidence that it has received to date demonstrates there is little to no impact on property values, especially in light of the proposed facility being located on the cap/top of a closed landfill. In addition, the proposed Special Use will have a positive impact on the County's overall tax base.
- 4. The proposed Special Use will enhance the provision of electric utilities to the area. The proposed Special Use will create no burden on existing utilities and provides a needed clean and renewable energy alternative. The proposed Special Use will not lead to an increase in traffic after it is constructed as the only additional traffic will be vehicles visiting the site for periodic maintenance and inspection.
- 5. There are no hospitals near the proposed Special Use that require special consideration and there are no schools near the proposed Special Use that require special consideration.
- 6. The adjacent uses are agricultural and recreational in nature. There are some residential uses in the general vicinity, however, such should not be impacted by the facility, given the distance from the solar facility to any residential use. Further, the proposed Special Use will be at a higher elevation than surrounding uses (top of the landfill cap), plus the north and east boundaries have wooded and lake buffers. The closest adjacent uses are an outdoor dirt go-kart track and outdoor soccer fields. Thus, the proposed Special Use, as limited by the motion of the Board, and with certain construction conditions and use limitations is compatible with adjacent uses and uses in the general vicinity.

The Board placed the following additional conditions and restrictions on the Special Use Permit:

- A. No overweight or oversized loads shall be delivered to the site, and the Applicant shall apply to the appropriate highway, road district or other authority regarding any necessary road permits and entrance permits.
- B. The Applicant shall secure and maintain any and all necessary permits from other State and Federal agencies to operate its proposed solar facility.
- C. Construction hours shall be limited to Monday through Friday, 7:00 am to 6:00 pm. No construction work is to be done on Saturdays, Sundays, evenings, or holidays unless written approval is obtained from the St. Clair County Building and Zoning Department Administrator.
- D. During excavation, site prep, or disturbance of soil onsite, any topsoil shall be preserved and returned to its prior condition.
- E. All vegetation, shrubbery or other planting shall be well-maintained and kept free of noxious weeds and invasive plants.
- F. The Applicant and all other subsequent lessees, agents, assigns, persons or entities that have any interest in, control over, or rights to the proposed Solar Farm Energy System shall adhere to all applicable requirements of the St. Clair County Zoning Code, including but not limited to Section 40-5-30, and all conditions and restrictions placed on this Special Use.
- G. This Special Use is limited to 30 years from the first day of construction; however, within the year that this Special Use is proposed to expire and prior to the expiration date, the owner, lessee, or operator may petition the St. Clair County Zoning Board of Appeals for a modification of this Special Use to extend the expiration date. (However, the Special Use Permit is only valid for two (2) years from the date of approval, unless within such period a building permit is obtained, and construction is commenced. See 40-11-41.)
- H. The Applicant and Owner prior to either party selling, transferring, sub-leasing, assigning, or transferring any interest or control in this Solar Farm Energy System or the real property it is constructed upon, shall notify, in writing, the St. Clair County Zoning Administrator of any impending transfer at least 30 days prior thereto, supplying the Administrator with the name, address, contact number, and e-mail address of the new owner, purchaser, lessee, assignee, or other new party in interest, and the Applicant and Owner shall provide the Administrator any such additional documents and information requested by the Administrator regarding the transfer, lease, or assignment.

WHEREAS, the County Board of St. Clair, Illinois, concur with the aforesaid findings, conditions and recommendations of the Zoning Board of Appeals;

Mr. Mayer had previously provided the Zoning Board with a packet of materials containing information, drawings, photos and engineered drawings regarding the proposed solar project. He further provided the Zoning Board with copies of his Power Point presentation. Mr. Mayer went over the Power Point slides providing an overview of AES Corporation and AES Belleville, LLC. AES Corporation was founded in 1981, headquarter in Arlington, VA, and has renewable energy facilities on 14 countries on 4 continents. AES Corporation has 35 GW of thermal and renewable generating assets. Further, he described AES Distributed Energy—it is a subsidiary of the AES Corporation, located in Louisville, CO, specializing in developing, owning and operating solar and battery storage projects. It currently has over 297 MW of solar energy projects in the United States, and 300+ MW under development. AES Belleville Solar, LLC is a wholly owned project company of AES Distributed Energy.

Applicant's project will be located on the old Laidlaw landfill (2381 Park Road, Belleville, IL) and will utilize approximately 55 acres of the 107-acre site. The size of the system will be 13.286 MW DC/9.9 MW AC and will be comprised of approximately 32,404 solar panels that will be situated upon ballasted racking (i.e., solar racks secured to large concrete ballast vs. driving supporting structures into the ground) upon the cap/top of the landfill. The solar panels will be a fixed-tilt system (15 degrees); there will be cable trays above ground, concrete pads for transformers; minimum 50 ft. setbacks from property boundary; 15 ft. setbacks from any vents, wells or piping currently installed on site; current fencing on site will be utilized with additional solar signage added; and the current entrance will be widened for construction traffic. Once operational the facility will be monitored remotely, with only necessary visits for maintenance or mowing.

Applicant indicated they have been working on this project for two years, and if approved by the County, the Applicant has the necessary approvals from the State of Illinois to proceed with the project immediately. Mr. Mayer stated this is different from previous applications before the Zoning Board, as before applicants were seeking local approval and then hoping to be awarded the REC credits from the State. In this case, the Applicant has already been awarded the REC

credits and needs local approval. He stated this will be one of the largest solar projects in the State of Illinois situated on a closed landfill.

Applicant in its packet to the Zoning Board provided a letter of approval from the IEPA (as well as other approval letters) for this project. IEPA's approval was necessary as the facility will be located on a closed landfill. The landfill is still inspected by the IEPA on a regular basis and Laidlaw must comply with IEPA closure laws and any deficiencies found at the landfill. Thus, such things as ballasted racking and above ground cable trays are necessary so there will be no penetration of the landfill cap. Also, engineering studies have been performed to determine if any settlement will occur to the landfill cap because of the ballasted racking and transformer pads. The studies indicated that there will be minimal settlement (1/2 inch) to the landfill cap during the life of the project (35 years).

Mr. Brian Sehie, Environmental Manger from Laidlaw/Republic Services testified that the facility quit receiving waste in 1993 and was formerly closed in 1997. The landfill is no longer settling but produces 100,000 gallons of leachate annually. Laidlaw/Republic Services is in support of the application. It acknowledged that it still must monitor the facility and make any necessary repairs to the facility pursuant to IEPA rules and regulations. Mr. Sehie addressed various questions from the Zoning Board regarding the operation of the landfill and protecting the landfill cap.

Mr. Mayer further reviewed the specifics of the ballasted racking, new driveway, construction schedule (approx. 6 to 8 months), additional traffic during construction only (20 to 40 vehicles per day) and the various studies and approvals Applicant has done and received—wetland survey, threatened and endangered species survey, Phase I Environmental Site Assessment study, geotechnical study of weight bearing capacity and settlement analysis of the landfill cap, stormwater analysis, IDNR Historical review (determination of no significance), IDNR EcoCAT (nothing located), FAA (no hazard determination), US Army Corps of Engineers (no jurisdiction), US Fish and Wildlife Service (no objection), IEPA (post closure use permit for a solar installation on cap) and IDOA (AIMA). Mr. Mayer also reviewed the project benefits—local tax revenue, renewable energy, and job stimulation.

No persons present testified for or against the proposed facility.

Witnesses having been sworn, testimony and evidence presented, and the Zoning Board of Appeals being fully advised in the premises, and the Board having considered the following in conjunction therewith, and found:

The Board made the following findings of fact:

- 1. The land in question is located in an "A" Agricultural Industry Zone District, is rural in nature, is adjacent to other farm fields to the north, south, and west, and has a wooded and lake buffer to the east that abuts an outdoor dirt go-kart track. The wooded buffer also runs the length of the northern property line, in which the north-west corner of the subject parcel abuts outdoor soccer fields. There are no residential structures in close proximity to the proposed Special Use. Further, the facility will be located on the cap of a closed landfill.
- 2. AES Belleville Solar, LLC, as owner and operator of the facility, is requesting a special use permit to construct a 13.286 MW DC/9.9 MW AC solar facility on a footprint of approximately 55 acres of the 107-acre parcel in question. Construction will likely begin in the Fall of 2020 with a 6-8 month construction timeline.
- 3. It is anticipated that the proposed facility will supply enough energy to meet the demands of approximately 2,167 homes annually.
- 4. The project will include typical photovoltaic panels on a fixed tilt ballasted racking system, with cable trays and transforms.

- 5. Once the project has been constructed there will be no added traffic on a daily basis. The only additional traffic will be for periodic inspection and maintenance.
- 6. The entire perimeter of the project site will be fenced by the existing chain link fence. Additional signage regarding the solar facility will be added.
- 7. There will be one access point off Park Road (current access point) to access the solar array, which shall be gated with appropriate signage and emergency access box.
- 8. The proposed setbacks of the project area shall meet or exceed the County's requirements, and the facility shall be installed per the plans submitted.
- 9. The LESA score for the site is 92, which is a low value for agricultural retention. The facility will be located on a closed landfill, and no portion of the subject parcel is located in a Special Flood Hazard Area as defined by the Federal Emergency Management Agency.
- 10. The Applicant further agrees to provide a decommissioning plan as determined and approved by the County before a building permit will be issued.

The Board found and concluded as follows:

- 1. Whether the proposed design, location, development and operation of the proposed Special Use will adequately protect the public health, safety, and welfare and the physical environment. The Board found as follows: The proposed design, location, development, and the operation of the proposed Solar Farm Energy System, as limited by this motion, adequately protects the public's health, safety and welfare, and physical environment; there is limited access to the site; the site currently has environmental buffers in place (trees and lakes); there will be a thorough decommissioning plan with financing in place for the decommissioning of the facility; the site will be fenced; there will be coordination with emergency personnel; the site due to it being a closed landfill will continuously be monitored and subject to IEPA rules and regulations; and the site will be appropriately maintained.
- 2. Whether the proposed Special Use is consistent with the County's comprehensive plan. The Board found as follows: The proposed Special Use as limited by this motion, will not have an adverse impact on the County's Comprehensive Plan, as the proposed special use is one considered in an Agricultural Industry Zoning District.
- 3. The effect the proposed Special Use may have on the value of the neighboring property and on the County's overall tax base. The Board found as follows: The proposed Special Use will have a similar impact as the current use of the property, in that the solar facility will make no more appreciable noise and will be appropriately screened and fenced. Further, the Board, when previously considering special use permits for similar solar farm energy systems, received general studies regarding the impact or lack thereof, of such solar developments on neighboring property values. While the Board recognizes a possible impact, the testimony and evidence that it has received to date demonstrates there is little to no impact on property values, especially in light of the proposed facility being located on the cap/top of a closed landfill. In addition, the proposed Special Use will have a positive impact on the County's overall tax base.
- 4. The availability and the effect the proposed Special Use would have on the public utilities and on traffic circulation on nearby streets. The Board found as follows: The proposed Special Use will enhance the provision of electric utilities to the area. The proposed Special Use will create no burden on existing utilities and provides a needed clean and renewable energy alternative. The proposed Special Use will not lead to an increase in traffic after it is constructed as the only additional traffic will be vehicles visiting the site for periodic maintenance and inspection.

- 5. Whether there are any facilities near the proposed Special Use (such as schools or hospitals) that require special consideration. The Board found as follows: There are no hospitals near the proposed Special Use that require special consideration and there are no schools near the proposed Special Use that require special consideration.
- 6. Whether the proposed Special Use is compatible to adjacent uses and uses in the general vicinity. The Board found as follows: The adjacent uses are agricultural and recreational in nature. There are some residential uses in the general vicinity, however, such should not be impacted by the facility, given the distance from the solar facility to any residential use. Further, the proposed Special Use will be at a higher elevation than surrounding uses (top of the landfill cap), plus the north and east boundaries have wooded and lake buffers. The closest adjacent uses are an outdoor dirt go-kart track and outdoor soccer fields. Thus, the proposed Special Use, as limited by the motion of the Board, and with certain construction conditions and use limitations is compatible with adjacent uses and uses in the general vicinity.
- 7. The time period for which the Special Use Permit should be granted or any special requirements for certification of continued compliance with the terms of approval. The Board found as follows: The Board placed the following additional conditions and restrictions on the Special Use Permit:
 - A. No overweight or oversized loads shall be delivered to the site, and the Applicant shall apply to the appropriate highway, road district or other authority regarding any necessary road permits and entrance permits.
 - B. The Applicant shall secure and maintain any and all necessary permits from other State and Federal agencies to operate its proposed solar facility.
 - C. Construction hours shall be limited to Monday through Friday, 7:00 am to 6:00 pm. No construction work is to be done on Saturdays, Sundays, evenings, or holidays unless written approval is obtained from the St. Clair County Building and Zoning Department Administrator.
 - D. During excavation, site prep, or disturbance of soil onsite, any topsoil shall be preserved and returned to its prior condition.
 - E. All vegetation, shrubbery or other planting shall be well-maintained and kept free of noxious weeds and invasive plants.
 - F. The Applicant and all other subsequent lessees, agents, assigns, persons or entities that have any interest in, control over, or rights to the proposed Solar Farm Energy System shall adhere to all applicable requirements of the St. Clair County Zoning Code, including but not limited to Section 40-5-30, and all conditions and restrictions placed on this Special Use.
 - G. This Special Use is limited to 30 years from the first day of construction; however, within the year that this Special Use is proposed to expire and prior to the expiration date, the owner, lessee, or operator may petition the St. Clair County Zoning Board of Appeals for a modification of this Special Use to extend the expiration date. (However, the Special Use Permit is only valid for two (2) years from the date of approval, unless within such period a building permit is obtained, and construction is commenced. See 40-11-41.)
 - H. The Applicant and Owner prior to either party selling, transferring, sub-leasing, assigning, or transferring any interest or control in this Solar Farm Energy System or the real property it is constructed upon, shall notify, in writing, the St. Clair County Zoning Administrator of any impending transfer at least 30 days prior thereto, supplying the Administrator with the name, address, contact number, and e-mail address of the new owner, purchaser, lessee, assignee, or other new party in interest, and the Applicant and Owner shall provide the

Administrator any such additional documents and information requested by the Administrator regarding the transfer, lease, or assignment.

A motion was made by S. Howell to recommend GRANTING the Special Use request, with the above conditions and restrictions. The motion was seconded by A. Edwards. The members of the Board voted as follows: S. Penny-Yes, A. Edwards-Yes, P. Gregory-Yes, S. Howell-Yes, M. Deitz-Yes, and G. Meister-Yes. The motion carried 6 to 0.

IT IS THEREFORE THE RECOMMENDATION OF THE ST. CLAIR COUNTY ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS THAT THE REQUESTED SPECIAL USE PERMIT BE *GRANTED* FOR THE AFOREMENTIONED REASONS AND WITH THE AFOREMENTIONED CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS BY A MAJORITY OF ALL MEMBERS PRESENT.

accreditation back, but all accreditations will be completed in FY 2021, using only revenue available from the dedicated FPD sales tax.

The May/June 2019 flood event (second highest event on record at 45.93 ft. and the longest flood event on record at 126 days), tested the seventy-five million dollars of flood protection improvements the Council built. However, all improvements performed as designed and the Metro East American Bottom Levees handled the event better than ever before.

The 2020 COVID-19 Pandemic will affect the Council's ability to fund Authorized Level projects. A return to sales tax receipts at a 2018/2019 level will be necessary for project completion.

The support of the leadership of the three counties has been a key factor in our progress, and we look forward to working with you to achieve the Authorized Level of Protection to the Metro East area.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT FOR THE AIRPORT ARCHAEOLOGICAL PLAN MIDAMERICA ST. LOUIS AIRPORT ST. CLAIR COUNTY

WHEREAS, a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) was executed December 2, 1999 implementing the Airport Archaeological Plan; and,

WHEREAS, Stipulation 7 of the MOA states, "the Airport Archaeological Plan shall remain in effect in perpetuity;" and,

WHEREAS, Stipulation 7 also provides for amendments to the MOA; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, the MOA signatories, which include St. Clair County, Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT), and State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO), agree to implement the Airport Archaeological Plan with the addition of the following three stipulations.

Stipulation 8. Update Appendix A and Appendix B of the MOA to (1) remove Site 11-S-801, which as been subject to data-recovery excavation in coordination with the SHPO; (2) add Sites 11-S-825, 11-S-984, and 11-S-1016 because they have been determined eligible for the National Register of Historic Places; and (3) adjust site location information and sign placement (per Appendix C), as time and funding allow for archaeological field resurvey and application of new mapping technologies.

Stipulation 9. Future updates to Appendix A and Appendix B are allowed, as needed, without amendment to the MOA, but only with written approval of St. Clair County, SHPO, and IDOT.

Stipulation 10. Future archaeological site excavations are allowed, without amendment to the MOA, but only when conducted in accordance with SHPO and IDOT guidelines and when determined necessary by SHPO and IDOT in writing.

Execution of this MOA Amendment #1 by St. Clair County, IDOT, and SHPO will update the Airport Archaeological Plan and will ensure the protection of archaeological sites listed in Appendix A.

ORDINANCE NO. 20-1242

AN ORDINANCE PERTAINING TO THE LOCAL CURE PROGRAM

WHEREAS, St. Clair County, Illinois, is an Illinois County, eligible for reimbursement of funds through the Local Coronavirus Urgent Remediation Emergency Support Program (Local CURE Program), 20 ILCS 605/605-1045; and

WHEREAS, the Local CURE Program is funded from financial assistance the State of Illinois received through the U.S. Department of the Treasury's Coronavirus Relief Fund (CFDA No. 21.019) authorized under section 601(a) of the Social Security Act, as added by section 5001 of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act, P.L. 116-136 ("CARES Act"); and

WHEREAS, as a Local Government recipient of financial support through the Local CURE Program, the County of St. Clair is required to utilize the financial support received from the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (the "Department") for the specific purposes and in compliance with the terms and certifications of the Local CURE Program; and

WHEREAS, the corporate authorities of the County of St. Clair have determined that it is advisable, necessary and in the best interest of the County to enter into the attached Local CURE Program Financial Support Conditions and Certification in order to participate in and receive the funding pursuant to the Local CURE Program.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED AS FOLLOWS:

ARTICLE 1

The foregoing recitals shall be and are hereby incorporated as findings of fact as if said recitals were fully set forth herein.

ARTICLE 2

The Financial Support Conditions and Certification in substantially the form of the exhibit attached hereto is hereby incorporated herein by reference; authorized and approved.

ARTICLE 3

The County Board Chairman is hereby authorized to execute and deliver and the County Clerk is hereby authorized to attest to said execution of said certification in substantially the form of the exhibit appended hereto as so authorized and approved for and on behalf of the County.

ARTICLE 4

SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this Ordinance or application thereof to any person or circumstances is ruled unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Ordinance that can be given effect without the invalid application or provision, and each invalid provision or invalid application of this Ordinance is severable.

ARTICLE 5

REPEAL OF CONFLICTING PROVISIONS. All ordinances and resolutions, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of the conflict, expressly repealed on the effective date of this Ordinance.

LOCAL CORONAVIRUS URGENT REMEDIATION EMERGENCY SUPPORT PROGRAM ("Local CURE Program")

FINANCIAL SUPPORT CONDITIONS AND CERTIFICATION

St. Clair County ("Local Government"), with its principal office at # 10 Public Square, 2nd FL, Belleville, IL 62220, is eligible to receive an amount not to exceed \$2,255,385 ("allotment") as financial support pursuant to the Local CURE Program.

The Local CURE Program is funded from financial assistance the State of Illinois received through the U.S. Department of the Treasury's Coronavirus Relief Fund (CFDA No. 21.019) authorized under section 601(a) of the Social Security Act, as added by section 5001 of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act, P.L. 116-136 ("CARES Act").

As a Local Government recipient of financial support through the Local CURE program, the Local Government is required to utilize the financial support received from the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (the "Department") for the specific purposes as set forth below. To participate in the Local CURE Program, the Local Government must remain in compliance with the terms and certifications stated herein. Please review the items below carefully, as the Local Government and its representative shall warrant that all material facts presented are accurate. If the Local Government is unable to provide this assurance, it is ineligible to receive financial support under the Local CURE Program.

The Department may enter into an agreement with one or more third parties to assist in the administration of the Local CURE Program. The Local Government shall adhere to all instructions or guidance issued by the Department's third party vendors in addition to those of the Department.

The allowable uses of program funds and eligible expenditures set forth in this certification will be modified by the Department, in accordance with the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act, if the CARES Act or the U.S. Department of the Treasury guidance is amended to authorize different categories of eligible uses or eligible expenses.

The Local Government should return this signed Financial Support Conditions and Certification by October 1, 2020.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT CONDITIONS

As the authorized representative of the Local Government, I agree and certify that the Local Government:

General Information

- 1. Provided true and accurate information on the following documents, as applicable: the application and the IRS Form W-9.
- 2. Will have, by the time Local Government submits its first request for reimbursement, an active registration on the federal System for Award Management ("SAM") and will maintain an active SAM registration throughout the duration of the Local Government's participation in the Local CURE Program.
- 3. Is a "unit of local government" as defined by the Illinois Constitution, Article VII, Section 1 and has the legal authority to apply for and receive financial support under the Local CURE Program.
- 4. Is not located completely within one or more of the five Illinois counties that received direct allotments from the CARES Act fund (Cook, DuPage, Kane, Lake, or Will).

Local CURE Program Requirements

- 5. Has incurred or will incur eligible costs, as defined by 14 Ill. Admin. Code Part 700, for which it will seek reimbursement from the Department under the Local CURE Program. Specifically, the costs incurred by the Local Government:
 - a. are necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency with respect to COVID-19:
 - b. are not accounted for in the budget most recently approved as of March 27, 2020 (the date of enactment of the CARES Act) for the unit of local government; and
 - c. were or will be incurred during the period that begins on March 1, 2020 and ends December 30, 2020.
- 6. Understands that pursuant to the Local CURE Program, the Local Government will only be permitted to seek reimbursement from the Department for costs that have already been expended for services performed or goods received. No advance payments will be permitted.
- 7. Shall seek reimbursement from one or more of the following five categories of eligible incurred expenses:
 - a. Medical expenses, including but not limited to: expenses of establishing temporary public medical facilities and other measures to increase COVID-19 treatment capacity, costs of providing COVID-19 testing, and emergency medical response expenses;
 - b. Public health expenses, including but not limited to: expenses for communication and enforcement by local governments of public health orders related to COVID-19;
 - c. Payroll expenses for public safety, public health, health care, human services, and similar employees whose services were substantially dedicated to mitigating or responding to COVID-19;
 - d. Expenses for actions taken to facilitate compliance with COVID-19 related public health measures; and
 - e. Any other COVID-19 related expenses reasonably necessary to the function of government, or for other uses approved by the Department, that satisfy the Local CURE Program eligibility criteria. The Local Government must document how expenses are related to COVID-19.

- 8. Understands that to be eligible for reimbursement, the Local Government must have had services performed or received goods to respond directly to the public health emergency with respect to COVID-19 by December 30, 2020.
- 9. Understands that it is Local Government's responsibility to communicate with and report to the Department Local Government's needs regarding the allotment on a regular basis, as directed by the Department. This includes the requirement that Local Government report as soon as practicable if it believes that a portion of the allotment will not be utilized by the Local Government, OR if Local Government is in need of additional funds in excess of the allotment, for costs which will be incurred by December 30, 2020 and which will comply with all the Local CURE Program requirements.
- 10. Understands that on or around November 1, 2020, the Department will send a notice to Local Government indicating that it must report in detail: (a) how Local Government intends to spend the remainder of the initial allotment, and (b) any anticipated eligible expenses through December 30, 2020 in excess of the local government's initial allotment. If, by December 1, 2020, Local Government does not submit a report to the Department, or the detailed report submitted by Local Government reveals that some or all of the allotment will not be utilized by the Local Government, the Department will redirect, in accordance with 14 Ill. Admin. Code Part 700, the projected unspent balance to other local governments eligible for the Local CURE Program, which have reported a need for funds.
- 11. Understands that all requests for reimbursement for any Local CURE Program allotment received by Local Government before February 1, 2021 must be received by the Department or its third party administrator by January 31, 2021.
- 12. Understands that if Local Government's allotment has a remaining balance of funds for which Local Government has not sought reimbursement by January 31, 2021, on February 1, 2021, the remaining balance will be redirected to one or more local governments eligible for the Local CURE Program, which have a need for funds.
- 13. Understands that if the Local Government receives an allotment on or after February 1, 2021, the Local Government must submit all requests for reimbursement for this allotment to the Department or its third party administrator by February 28, 2021.
- 14. Understands that for any allotment received by Local Government on or after December 1, 2020, to be eligible for reimbursement, the Local Government must have had services performed or received goods to respond directly to the public health emergency with respect to COVID-19 by December 30, 2020.
- 15. Understands that the Local Government will submit to the Department or its third party administrator requests for reimbursement on forms provided by the Department or its third party administrator, including all required supporting documentation and in the manner requested by the Department or third party administrator, that the third party administrator will review the information received for eligibility, and if approved, the payment(s) will be released by the Department to the Local Government.
- 16. Understands that funds received through the Local CURE Program may not be used to fill shortfalls in the Local Government's revenue to cover expenditures that would not otherwise qualify under the program unless the Department authorizes such expenditures, in accordance with the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act, after a modification to the CARES Act or subsequent guidance issued by the U.S. Department of the Treasury.

- 17. Shall not seek reimbursement for incurred expenses under the Local CURE Program for which the Local Government has received or will receive a duplicate benefit through another State or federal funding opportunity.
- 18. Understands that any funding provided through the Local CURE Program is authorized under section 601(a) of the Social Security Act, as added by section 5001 of the CARES Act. The Local Government shall follow all requirements of the CARES Act, including, but not limited to, all related guidance, including subsequent guidance, issued by the U.S. Department of the Treasury.
- 19. Shall use the funds received from the Department in accordance with the requirements of the Local CURE Program, including the statute (20 ILCS 605/605-1045), rules (14 Ill. Admin. Code Part 700), including any amendments thereto, and all written guidance and manuals issued by the Department and/or its third party administrator. The Department, as the administrator of the Local CURE Program, has the authority to take any action necessary to bring Local Government into compliance with the program requirements.
- 20. Understands that the Department reserves the right to seek a refund from the Local Government if the Department, another State agency or the federal government finds that the Local Government: (a) made a false or fraudulent statement to the Department or its third party administrator; (b) made a false or fraudulent claim for funds; or (c) spent the Local CURE Program funds on ineligible expenses or for duplicate costs that were reimbursed through another federal or State program.

Local CURE Program Administrative Requirements

- 21. Shall provide all necessary forms, documentation and information as required or requested by the Department or its third party administrator(s) to operate the Local CURE Program.
- 22. Shall submit all required reports and information requested by the Department or the third party administrator including, but not limited to, information demonstrating funds received under the Local CURE Program were deposited in an account held by the Local Government.
- 23. When requesting a reimbursement, shall submit a report certifying the costs, as required by 2 CFR 200.415, and provide all documentation and information required by 14 Ill. Admin. Code Part 700, and any other information requested by the Department or its third party administrator.
- 24. Shall include Local CURE funding in the applicable financial statement and/or audit of the Local Government, including a Single Audit pursuant to the Single Audit Act (31 U.S.C. §§7501-7507).
- 25. Shall not seek reimbursement for costs paid to an entity on the federal or State debarred and suspended list.
- 26. Shall comply with the following provisions of the Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (2 CFR Part 200): 2 CFR 200.303 regarding internal controls; 2 CFR 200.330 through 200.332 regarding subrecipient monitoring and management; subpart E regarding cost eligibility requirements; and subpart F regarding audit requirements.

General Administrative Requirements

- 27. Is complying with all relevant State and federal laws and regulations.
- 28. And its affiliate(s), is/are not barred from receiving the Local CURE Program funds because the Local Government, or its affiliate(s), is/are delinquent in the payment of any debt to the State, unless the Local Government, or its affiliate(s), has/have entered into a deferred payment plan to pay off the debt, and the Local Government acknowledges the Department may terminate and/or seek a refund of the Local Government's Local CURE Program allotment if this certification is false (30 ILCS 500/50-11).
- 29. Shall continue to comply, as applicable, with the provisions of the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act (40 U.S.C. 327-333), the Copeland Act (40 U.S.C. 276c and 18 U.S.C. 874), the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. 276a-276-1), the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988 (44 CFR, Part 17, Subpart F), the Fair Labor Standards Act (29 U.S.C. 201), and the Illinois Prevailing Wage Act (820 ILCS 130/1).
- 30. Shall comply with all relevant laws and regulations concerning non-discrimination.
- 31. Shall pay no appropriated funds to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of federal, State or local government, or an employee of a member of any federal, State or local government in connection with the awarding of any State and federal contract, the making of any State and federal grant, the making of any State and federal loan, the entering into any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any State and federal contract, grant, loan or cooperative agreement.
- 32. Shall prohibit employees, contractors, and subcontractors from using their positions for a purpose that constitutes or presents an appearance of personal or organizational conflict of interests or personal gain.
- 33. Has no action, lawsuit or proceeding pending or, to the knowledge of the Local Government, threatened which questions the legality or propriety of the transactions contemplated by the receipt of funds through the Local CURE Program or which will have a material adverse effect on the performance required by the Local Government.
- 34. Has not received any notice of any investigation conducted or charges, complaints or actions brought by the State of Illinois or any governmental body within the State of Illinois regarding the Local Government or its principals and key personnel that will be involved in the use of the Local CURE Program funds received.
- 35. Has not received any notice that any of its principals or key personnel that will be involved in the use of the Local CURE Program funds are the subject of any criminal investigations or charges.
- 36. Understands that neither the Department nor the Local Government shall be liable for actions chargeable to the other party related to the Department's provision of funds to the Local Government including, but not limited to, the negligent acts and omissions of a party's agents, employees or subcontractors in the performance of their duties, unless such liability is imposed by law.
- 37. Understands that receiving funds pursuant to the Local CURE Program is contingent upon and subject to the availability of sufficient funds. The Department may terminate or suspend the Local Government's allotment, in whole or in part, without penalty or further payment being required, if (i) sufficient funds have not been appropriated or otherwise made available to the Department by the State or the federal funding source, (ii) the Governor or the Department

reserves funds, or (iii) the Governor or the Department determines that funds will not or may not be available for payment. The Department shall provide notice, in writing, to the Local Government of any such funding failure and its election to terminate or suspend Local Government's allotment as soon as practicable. Any suspension or termination pursuant to this paragraph will be effective upon the date of the written notice unless otherwise indicated.

Accessibility of Records and Retention

- 38. Shall make books, records, related papers, supporting documentation, financial records and personnel relevant to the Local CURE Program available to authorized Department representatives, the Illinois Auditor General, Illinois Attorney General, any Executive Inspector General, federal authorities, and any other person as may be authorized by the Department (including auditors), by the State of Illinois or by federal statute. Local Government shall cooperate fully in any such audit or inquiry. Failure by the Local Government to maintain books, records, financial records and supporting documentation shall establish a presumption in favor of the State for the recovery of any funds paid by the State under the Local CURE Program for which adequate books, records, financial records and supporting documentation are not available to support disbursement.
- 39. Understands that the Department or its third party administrator will conduct monitoring of the Local CURE Program to ensure funds were spent in accordance with the Local CURE Program statute and the administrative rules.
- 40. Shall provide to any agent authorized by the Department, upon presentation of credentials, full access to, and the right to examine, any document, papers and records either in hard copy or electronic format, of the Local Government involving transactions related to the Local CURE Program.
- 41. Shall maintain for five (5) years from the date of submission of the final request for reimbursement, adequate books, all financial records and supporting documents, statistical records and all other records pertinent to the Local CURE Program. If any litigation, claim or audit is started before the expiration of the retention period, the records must be retained until all litigation, claims or audit exceptions involving the records have been resolved and final action taken.

Other Expenditures Prohibited by the CARES Act

The prohibition on payment for abortions does not apply to an abortion if the pregnancy is the result of an act of rape or incest; or in the case where a woman suffers from a physical disorder, physical injury, or physical illness, including a life-endangering physical condition

caused by or arising from the pregnancy itself, that would, as certified by a physician, place the woman in danger of death unless an abortion is performed.

Invoices for the Engineer's services shall be submitted, at the Engineer's option, either upon completion of such services or on a monthly basis. Invoices shall be due and payable upon receipt. If any invoice is not paid within 30 days, the Engineer may, without waiving any claim or right against the Client, and without liability whatsoever to the Client, suspend or terminate the performance of services. Accounts unpaid 30 days after the invoice date may be subject to a monthly service charge of 1.5% (annual rate equals 18%) on the unpaid balance. In the event any portion of an account remains unpaid 60 days after the billing, the Engineer may institute collection action and the Client shall pay all costs of collection, including reasonable attorney's fees.

Client Furnished Material: The Client agrees to furnish the Engineer full Information as to the Project requirements including, but not limited to, any special or extraordinary considerations for the Project or special services needed, and also make available all pertinent existing data.

Hazardous Materials: When hazardous materials are known, assumed or suspected to exist at a project site, the Engineer is required to take appropriate precautions to protect the health and safety of his employees, and to comply with applicable laws and regulations. The Client hereby warrants that, if he knows or has any reason to assume or suspect that hazardous materials may exist at the project site, he has so informed the Engineer.

Insurance: The Engineer agrees to maintain worker's compensation and employer's liability insurance of a form and in an amount as required by state law, comprehensive general liability and automotive liability insurance, and professional liability insurance.

Nothing contained in this Agreement shall create a contractual relationship with or a cause of action in favor of any third party against either the Engineer or the Client

Certifications, Guarantees and Warranties: The Engineer shall not be required to execute any document that would result in the Engineer certifying, guaranteeing or warranting the existence of any conditions.

Construction Cost Estimate: Construction cost estimates, if any, prepared by the Engineer, represent the Engineer's best judgment as a design professional. It is recognized, however, that neither the Engineer nor the Client has control over the cost of labor, materials or equipment, over the Contractors' methods of determining bid prices or over competitive bidding, market or negotiating conditions. Accordingly, the Engineer cannot and does not warrant or represent that bids or negotiated prices will not vary from Client's budget or from any estimates of cost prepared by Engineer.

Limitation of Liability: The Client recognizes the inherent risks connected with projects of this type. The Client agrees to limit the Engineer's liability to the Client and to all construction contractors and subcontractors on the project, due to the Engineer's negligent acts, errors or omissions, such that the aggregate liability of the Engineer to all those named shall not exceed \$50,000 or the Engineer's total fee for services rendered on the project, whichever is greater.

Ownership of Documents: All documents produced by the Engineer under this Agreement are instruments of the Engineer's professional service and shall remain the property of the Engineer and may not be used by the Client for any other purpose without the prior written consent of the Engineer.

Dispute Resolution: Any claims or disputes between the Client and the Engineer arising out of the services to be provided by the Engineer or out of this Agreement shall be submitted to non-binding mediation.

Severability: If any provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall remain in full force and are binding on Engineer and Client.

Termination of Services: This Agreement may be terminated at any time by either party should the other party fail to perform its obligations hereunder. Attornoy Fees & Costs: In any action incurred to enforce this Agreement or defend the services provided in accord with this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees.
