

Mr. Owen Brickell presented the case. Mr. Brickell is one of the owners of the property in question and currently resides on the property with his wife. Mr. Brickell is also the pastor at the MSJH Church (Mustard Seed Jam House). The Church was once located in the City of Mascoutah; however, the Applicant built a pole barn on his property and moved the Church into the building. He stated that he has Sunday services, as well as youth group meetings on Friday evenings (6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.). The congregation of the Church is between 20 to 30 members and the youth group has a gathering of 10 to 20 persons. He stated that he built the building to be used as a church. Mr. Brickell obtained the plans for the building from the internet and then he and other Church members built the building. Mr. Brickell installed the plumbing and ran electric in the building. The building has a non-commercial kitchen, bathrooms, no windows, two entrances/exit doors across from each other, and has approximately 24 parking spots. Mr. Brickell estimated that the distance from his house to the building is a 132 ft. The building has no fire suppression, and Mr. Brickell did not have engineered plans for the building. Mr. Brickell installed a private septic system. The system installed is not properly sized to be utilized for groups over 20 people per the St. Clair County Health Department.

The Zoning Administrator stated that this case was red tagged. Mr. Brickell did not apply for a building permit when he started building the structure. After being red tagged he came in an applied for a building permit, but he indicated that the building was for non-commercial purposes, his own personal use. He executed affidavit stating such. Later it was learned by the Building and Zoning Department he was operating a church in the building. The building had no inspections—footing, plumbing, electrical or any structural inspections, because the Applicant had completed the building without the proper permits.

County Board Member Kevin Dawson stated he learned a lot of new information about the building at the hearing and while not necessarily objecting to the application for a church, he is not in favor of it given the new information learned on how the building was constructed.

Lance Stratton, 8114 Peabody Road, Freeburg testified in favor of the church. He stated he is a member of the church/congregation and there was zero intent on Mr. Brickell's part to misrepresent the facility to the Building and Zoning Department. Mr. Stratton believes everyone needs to work together to make this application work.

William Seibert, Jefferson Road, Mascoutah, IL, testified in opposition to the application. He stated that he has heard there is parking along State Rte. 4 during Sunday services. He is also concerned with the sewage from the church.

Gary Seibert, 9825 Jefferson Road, Mascoutah, IL, testified in opposition to the application. He farms west of the property and he is concerned with a church/business coming out to this rural area. He is concerned that he will receive complaints regarding dust and spraying from his farming operations.

Danny Anderson, 1222 Larkspur Drive, Mascoutah, IL testified in favor of the application. He believes there is enough parking for the church. He is a member of the church and believes it is a good thing for the area.

Ron Haas, 9901 Lischer Road, Mascoutah, IL stated he farms the Kraske farm to the north of the subject property and is against the application. He is concerned regarding parking for the church, as overflow may resulting in parking along State Rte. 4, which is traveled by farm implements, causing concern.

Witnesses having been sworn, testimony and evidence presented, and the Zoning Board of Appeals being fully advised in the premises, and the Board having considered the following in conjunction therewith, and found:

- 1. Whether the proposed design, location, development and operation of the proposed Special Use will adequately protect the public health, safety, and welfare and the physical environment. The Board found as follows: The proposed design, location, development, and the operation of the proposed church does not adequately protect the public's health, safety and welfare, and physical environment as there is no evidence that the building was constructed in way that would meet all building code requirements for the safety of the public that may enter the church. There were no inspections conducted as the Applicant did not get a building permit prior to commencing construction, and then once a permit was obtained it was noted by the Applicant that the building was to be used for personal use versus commercial purposes. Further, appropriate parking space is uncertain, there is only one entrance/exit off a busy State route highway, and the private septic system is not adequately sized. Lastly, the plans for the structure were obtained from the internet and no sealed plans have been submitted by the Applicant.

They also work on Saturday. There will be no customers coming to this site, no storage of landscaping materials, no burning of landscape waste, no office on site, and no sales from this location. This location is used solely to store equipment—4 trucks and 4 trailers with lawnmowing equipment inside. No chemicals will be stored on site.

Mr. Miller stated that on the north and east sides of his property there are tree line buffers.

The City of O'Fallon is opposed to the application; however, O'Fallon Township is in favor of the application.

The Board found as follows: The proposed Special Use would not have a negative impact on the value of neighboring property and the proposed Special Use would have no effect on the County's overall tax base.
- (4) The availability and the effect the proposed Special Use would have on the public utilities and on traffic circulation on nearby streets. The Board found as follows: There will be minimal effect on traffic circulation, and there will be no negative effect on public utilities.
- (5) Whether there are any facilities near the proposed Special Use (such as schools or hospitals) that require special consideration. The Board found as follows: There are no hospitals or schools in close proximity to the proposed Special Use that require special consideration given the nature of the proposed Special Use.
- (6) Whether the proposed Special Use is compatible to adjacent uses and uses in the general vicinity. The Board found as follows: The proposed Special Use is compatible to other uses in the general vicinity, i.e., the storage of items inside of sheds.
- (7) The time period for which the Special Use Permit should be granted or any special requirements for certification of continued compliance with the terms of approval. The Board found as follows: The Special Use Permit shall be to Logan Domina only and shall neither run with the land nor the corporation (Superior Outdoor, Inc.).

A motion was made by A. Edwards to GRANT the request with the above conditions/limitations/requirements. The motion was seconded by K. Heberer. The members of the Board voted as follows: S. Penny-Yes, A. Edwards-Yes, G. Meister-Yes, M. Deitz-Yes, and K. Heberer-Yes. The motion carried 5 to 0.

IT IS THEREFORE THE RECOMMENDATION OF THE ST. CLAIR COUNTY ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS THAT THE REQUESTED SPECIAL USE PERMIT BE *GRANTED*, FOR THE AFOREMENTIONED REASONS AND WITH THE AFOREMENTIONED CONDITIONS/LIMITATIONS/REQUIREMENTS, BY A MAJORITY OF ALL MEMBERS PRESENT.

This County Board hereby consents to the City's request that the Illinois General Assembly extend its TIF District #3 for an additional twelve (12) years through amendment to Section 11-74.4-3.5(c) of the Illinois Municipal Code (65 ILCS 5/11-74.4-3.5(c)), conditioned upon the declaration of fifty (50%) of the revenue collected during such extension by TIF District #3 Special Allocation Fund after December 30, 2021, and until TIF District #3 expires or is terminated, as surplus revenue, to be distributed back to the affected taxing districts, subject to the City's approval of a Resolution declaring fifty (50%) of the revenue collected during such extension by TIF District #3 Special Allocation Fund after December 30, 2021, and until TIF District #3 expires or is terminated, as surplus revenue, to be distributed back to the affected taxing districts, as well as the City's execution of an Intergovernmental Agreement with the County related to same, both in a form approved by the State's Attorney.

<u>Section 2</u>. This County Board hereby authorizes and directs its Chairman to notify the City of the consent contemplated hereunder in writing.

<u>Section 3</u>. This resolution shall be in full force and effect upon its adoption.

LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICE AGREEMENT

THIS SERVICE AGREEMENT ("Agreement"), is made and entered into by and between THE BI-STATE DEVELOPMENT AGENCY OF THE MISSOURI-ILLINOIS METROPOLITAN DISTRICT ("Bi-State"), and ST. CLAIR COUNTY, ILLINOIS for services provided by the ST. CLAIR COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT ("St. Clair County Sheriff's Department").

WHEREAS, Bi-State operates the MetroLink light rail system ("Metrolink System"), in St. Clair County, Illinois; the City of St. Louis, Missouri and St. Louis County, Missouri; and

WHEREAS, Bi-State is responsible for the operation of the St. Clair County MetroLink extension; and

WHEREAS, an integral part of Bi-State's operation is the security of its customers who ride upon the MetroLink System; and

WHEREAS, Bi-State desires to provide its MetroLink trains with additional law enforcement protection and presence; and

WHEREAS, the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department provides law enforcement service throughout St. Clair County, utilizing qualified and trained deputy sheriffs; and

WHEREAS, Bi-State has adopted ordinances regulating the behavior of its patrons on MetroLink trains and their attendant facilities; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to enter into a Service Agreement whereby the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department will provide certain law enforcement services including the enforcement of such ordinances as Bi-State may adopt, and Bi-State will compensate the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department for such services; and

WHEREAS, Bi-State also desires to have such deputy sheriffs serve as good will ambassadors for Bi-State in the performance of their duties; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises set forth hereunder, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, Bi-State and the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department hereby agree as follows:

ARTICLE I-TERM

- 1.1 Term. This Service Agreement shall commence on July 1, 2021 and shall be for a term of twelve (12) months, ending on June 30, 2022.
- 1.2 Early Termination. Either party can terminate its rights and obligations under this Service Agreement, provided that sixty (60) days advance notice is given to the other party.

ARTICLE II -COMPENSATION

- 2.1 Compensation. Bi-State agrees to pay St. Clair County Sheriff's Department, for services provided by the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department as enumerated in this Agreement and illustrated in Exhibit A, an amount not to exceed ONE MILLION EIGHT HUNDRED FORTY EIGHT THOUSAND AND HUNDRED FOUR DOLLARS SIXTY EIGHT CENTS (\$1,848,904.68.) for the period of July 1, 2021 to June 30, 2022. St. Clair County Sheriff's Department shall invoice Bi-State on a monthly basis at the rate outlined in Exhibit A, attached hereto and made a part hereof. Actual cost is at all times subject to verification by an independent outside auditor. Bi-State's auditors may meet semiannually with St. Clair County Sheriff's Department (November and May) to review and reconcile costs, with the necessary adjustments being made to the payment schedule.
- 2.2 Time and Manner of Payment. Bi-State shall pay St. Clair County Sheriff's Department monthly in accordance with the terms and schedules attached hereto as Exhibit A. In addition, the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department shall submit monthly invoices for the expenses incurred by the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department beyond normal or ordinary expenses or for expenses incurred in carrying out the duties prescribed hereunder other than during normal scheduled hours that have been discussed with and approved by Bi- State in advance and that are verified by written documentation regarding the amount, nature, and justification for same. The scheduled monthly payments are based upon each deputy sheriff being present for duty full time for two-hundred twenty (220) days annually at eight (8) hours per shift, or one-hundred forty-seven (147) days annually at twelve (12) hours per shift. The actual time on duty as documented pursuant to Section 3.1 of this Agreement shall be reviewed between the parties on a quarterly basis until the expiration of this Agreement. If, following the quarterly reviews and reconciliations, it is determined that the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department deputies did not work the appropriate number of hours based upon such rate of availability, then a proportionate adjustment to the compensation shall be made by a reduction in the next following month's scheduled payment. In the event, however, that there are no further payments due from the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department to Bi-State, or if any such remaining payments are insufficient to allow for such proportionate adjustment, then such adjustment, or any portion thereof not able to be adjusted

against a remaining payment or payments, shall be reimbursed directly from the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department to Bi-State. If such an adjustment(s) reduces the scheduled payment to the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department, and a subsequent review shows that the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department officers have, in fact, provided, in whole or in part, those work hours for which such prior adjustment was made, Bi-State shall then pay the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department the amount of said prior adjustment to the extent the cumulative hours subsequently worked shall have made up for such prior shortage of hours. In this manner a compensation adjustment in a prior period can be restored in a subsequent period such that the net adjustment shall be based upon the total hours worked over the entire term of this Agreement. Work time lost by St. Clair County deputies as a result of injuries incurred while performing duties for Bi- State pursuant to this Agreement will be reimbursed to St. Clair County Sheriff's Department consistent with the provisions of the Illinois Police Officer Disability and Workers Compensation Law.

- 2.3 Monthly Payment. St. Clair County Sheriff's Department will bill Bi-State \$141,831.26 monthly for the duration of this Agreement for the normal day-to-day operations of its deputy sheriff's assigned to Bi-State. Overtime will be billed by St. Clair County Sheriff's Department on a monthly basis, as it is approved and incurred, up to \$39,942 (see Exhibit A, attached hereto). Any amount over \$39,942 must be agreed upon and approved by Bi-State for the duration of this Agreement.
- 2.4 Average Holiday/Sick Buyout and Related Fringe Costs. St. Clair County Sheriff's Department will bill Bi-State for costs associated with Average Holiday/Sick Buyout and related fringe costs on a monthly basis as costs are incurred up to \$106,987.50 (see Exhibit A, attached hereto).
- 2.5 Extra Deputy Sheriff's. Bi-State may, from time to time, request that extra or additional Street Patrol Deputy Sheriff's from the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department be assigned to MetroLink for special events and other extra service. Such extra deputy sheriffs shall not be considered a part of the ordinary compensation set out in this Article II. The St. Clair County Sheriff's Department shall make its best efforts to supply such requested extra deputy sheriffs. Bi-State shall compensate the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department for such extra deputy sheriffs assigned to work overtime by paying to the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department the actual cost of wages (including any premiums paid for overtime) and other direct wage-related costs, for such additional deputy sheriffs. Payment by Bi-State shall be made within thirty (30) days after receipt of an invoice for such extra services.
 - 2.6 Medical Costs. Bi-State agrees to renegotiate the provisions of this Agreement relating to compensation if the cost of medical insurance provided to deputy sheriffs hereunder by St. Clair County increases by more than five percent (5%) over the medical insurance costs projected in the term of this Agreement.

ARTICLE III - SERVICES PROVIDED BY ST. CLAIR COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT

- 3.1 Deputy Sheriffs. The St. Clair County Sheriff's Department shall provide a total of fifteen (15) uniformed deputy sheriffs from the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department consisting of one (1) deputy sheriff of the rank of Lieutenant, two (2) deputy sheriffs of the rank of Sergeant, and twelve (12) deputy sheriffs of the rank of Street Patrol Deputy. Such deputy sheriffs will work individually and will report to designated locations as determined by Bi-State. Work time will be determined by Bi-State in consultation with the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department. Such documentation of work time, location, and activities shall include: time and location of reporting to duty and when completing duty, activities while on duty, time away from the MetroLink alignment when on-duty, and such other matters relating to their MetroLink police duties, as shall be agreed upon by the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department and Bi-State. However, said deputy sheriffs shall at all times report to and be subject to the supervision of their superior officers of the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department and to the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department recognized chain of command. Said deputy sheriffs are not subordinates of or subject to the authority of Bi-State; however, will be immediately removed at Bi-State's request if it is determined that said deputy sheriff is not performing in accordance with this Agreement. The St. Clair County Sheriff's Department shall use its best efforts to cooperate with Bi-State in the performance of its duties hereunder.
- 3.2 Supervision. The administrative control of work assignments and deployment shall be the responsibility of Bi-State and operational command and control of the Sheriff's Deputies shall be the responsibility of the Sheriff's Unit Commander in consultation with Bi-State.
- 3.3 Status of Deputies. The deputy sheriffs performing services under the terms of this Agreement shall for all purposes be considered employees of the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department and not employees of Bi-State.
- 3.4 Duties of Deputies. The duties of each deputy sheriff providing services under the terms of this Agreement shall include, but not be limited to:
 - a. Provision of "roving" police patrol duties consisting of being present on the MetroLink trains and within the premises of Bi-State used as stations to facilitate the transportation of its customers and said deputy sheriffs shall perform their normal and lawful duties as law enforcement officers sworn to uphold and enforce the laws of the State of Illinois, and the various ordinances within the deputy sheriffs' jurisdictions (including such jurisdictions as may be authorized pursuant to any joint or mutual aid services agreements). No officer, however, shall be required by this Agreement to perform any duties outside of the State of Illinois, except that the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department agrees that its deputy

sheriffs may, in the course and scope of their employment as MetroLink officers: i) enter the State of Missouri, under the conditions permitted by Illinois law, for the purpose of apprehending a suspect in the course of a fresh pursuit of an individual observed to commit or suspected of committing a felony offense under the laws of the State of Illinois, and ii) enter into the State of Missouri in order to monitor ongoing suspicious activity on a MetroLink conveyance and remain in the State of Missouri until an officer of the appropriate Missouri jurisdiction has responded to the scene.

- b. Actively and visibly patrolling MetroLink trains, stations, parkand-ride lots and other MetroLink customer facilities; interacting positively with MetroLink customers and providing appropriate assistance to customers; enforcement of the MetroLink fare system when on duty and not actively engaged in other police work; issuance of citations, including citations for fare violations; and arranging for the picking up, transporting and processing of offenders.
- c. Responding to subpoenas, court appearances and trials as required for violations.
- d. Enforcing the provisions of Regulations adopted by the Board of Commissioners of Bi-State pursuant to 45 ILCS 110/5 to the extent the provisions are not inconsistent with provisions of Illinois law. The Regulations are hereby incorporated in this Agreement by reference.
- e. Devoting 80% of their time to on train activity when not involved in an arrest or detail situation.
- 3.5 Charging Authority. For an offense committed on Bi-State facilities or conveyances, nothing in this Agreement shall be deemed to interfere with, impede, or in any way diminish the authority of St. Clair County Deputy Sheriffs, at their discretion, to charge any applicable offense under state law or local ordinance, provided that no citation for the same offense shall be issued pursuant to the Regulations.
- 3.6 Times of Service. Bi-State's Metro Public Safety Department Management is responsible for determining when and where deputies working through this Agreement will be assigned in consultation with the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department. The detail commander will be responsible for scheduling. The deputy sheriffs shall perform the agreed services, as scheduled, in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement seven (7) days a week throughout the St. Clair County

service area of MetroLink. Such schedules shall be known as the MetroLink Deputy Sheriffs' Work Schedules.

- 3.7 Command Level Review Meetings. Command level review meetings between the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department and Bi-State shall be held at the request of either party, in order to discuss the services under this Agreement; personnel qualifications and complaints; work assignments and hours; reports made and/or needed by either party; and to discuss and resolve any other areas of mutual concern.
- 3.8 Reports. The St. Clair County Sheriff's Department will submit monthly reports of police work and crime statistics on MetroLink to Bi-State in a form acceptable to Bi-State in consultation with the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department.

ARTICLE IV-INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE

- 4.1 Indemnification of Bi-State by St. Clair County. To the fullest extent permitted by applicable law and as between Bi-State and the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department only, St. Clair County shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless Bi-State, its Commissioners, officers, officials, agents and employees from and against any and all claims, suits, actions, judgments, fines, penalties, loss, damage, cost, or expense, whether direct or indirect, due to bodily injury or personal injury, death, sickness or property damage (including loss or use thereof) arising out of the activities of the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department or deputy sheriffs thereof, or resulting from the performance of service under this Agreement, to the extent that activities and performance of services are contrary to the terms of this Agreement or are otherwise attributable to the actions of the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department; provided, however, that such indemnification shall not apply to the extent any such claim shall result from the negligence or intentional acts of Bi-State or its employees, Commissioners, officers and agents (other than the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department or its employees).
- 4.2 Indemnification of St. Clair County by Bi-State. To the fullest extent permitted by applicable law, and as between Bi-State and the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department only, Bi-State shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless St. Clair County, its elected and appointed officials, agents and employees from and against any and all claims, suits, actions, judgments, fines, penalties, loss, damage, cost, or expense, whether direct or indirect, due to bodily injury or personal injury, death, sickness or property damage (including loss or use thereof) arising out of the activities of Bi-State, its officers, agents or employees acting within the scope of their employment, occasioned by an intentional act or the negligence of Bi-State, its officers, agent or employees, provided however, that such indemnification shall not apply to the extent that any such claim shall arise from the negligence or intentional act(s) of the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department or its agents or employees.

Bi-State and St. Clair County agree that, for the purposes of insurance and indemnification, the St. Clair County Sheriff's Deputies administering or implementing any responsibilities or duties relating to the "on-board fare" program of Bi-State, including but not limited to issuing "on-board fare" envelopes shall be considered agents of Bi-State, but only for action taken by deputy sheriffs within the scope of the "on-board fare" program contained in this Agreement, and that Bi-State shall indemnify and hold harmless St. Clair County, to the extent permitted by law, from and against any or all claims, suits, actions, judgments, fines, penalties, loss, damage, cost or expense, whether direct or indirect, that arises or may arise from any action or activity taken by St. Clair County deputy sheriffs associated with the "on-board fare" program.

Such obligations shall not be construed to waive, negate, abridge, or reduce, other rights or obligations of indemnity, which would otherwise exist as to either the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department or Bi-State, nor shall this Articles 4.1 and 4.2 be construed or interpreted to waive, negate, abridge or reduce the sovereign immunity of the State of Illinois, St. Clair County, the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department, or Bi-State and the immunity of their agents, officers and employees.

4.3 Insurance and Self-Insurance. It is hereby understood and acknowledged that Bi-State, the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department, and St. Clair County are self-insured for purposes of general liability, commercial general, automobile liability, professional liability and workers' compensation/employer liability.

Bi-State shall provide to St. Clair County a current audited financial statement of its self-insurance fund and Certificates of Insurance for its excess liability coverage, including the self-insured retention for each coverage. St. Clair County shall provide to Bi-State a current audited financial statement of its self-insurance fund and Certificates of Insurance for its excess liability coverage, including the self-insured retention for each coverage.

ARTICLE V - MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

5.1 Notices. Any and all notices, communications and the like required or authorized hereunder, shall be deemed to be given if hand delivered or mailed by first class United States mail to the respective address of the parties listed below:

Either party may, by notice given hereunder, designate any further or different person or address to which subsequent notices and communication shall be sent.

- 5.2 Severability of Provisions. The parties agree that if any provisions of this Agreement shall be held invalid, unenforceable, void, or voidable for any reason whatsoever, by a court of competent jurisdiction, the finding or order or decree of which becomes final, the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall not be affected thereby if such remaining provisions could then continue to conform with the purposes, terms, and requirements of the Agreement or with applicable law.
- 5.3 Integration and Amendment. This Agreement, including the contents of any and all documents incorporated by reference or attached hereto, comprises the entire agreement between the parties. There are no promises, terms, conditions or obligations other than those contained herein, attached hereto or incorporated by reference hereunder. Any amendments, additions, supplements or deletions to this Agreement must be in writing, with the mutual consent of both parties and signed by both parties. No action shall be taken pursuant to any such amendment, addition, supplement or deletion prior to the execution of such written instrument.
- 5.4 Law. The laws of the State of Illinois shall govern this Agreement, its interpretation and any dispute arising out of its operation.

ORDINANCE NO. <u>21-1252</u>

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING APPORTIONMENT PLAN ESTABLISHING THE COUNTY BOARD DISTRICTS IN ST. CLAIR COUNTY, ILLINOIS (EFFECTIVE DECEMBER 2022)

WHEREAS, St. Clair County has twenty-nine (29) County Board Districts;

WHEREAS, Section 2-3002(a) of the Illinois Counties Code (55 ILCS 5/2-3002(a)) requires the St. Clair County Board to reapportion its County Board Districts by July after the census has been completed every ten years, utilizing the process set forth in Section 2-3003 of the Illinois Counties Code (55 ILCS 2-3003);

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 2-3003 of the Illinois Counties Code (55 ILCS 5/2-3003), the St. Clair County Board Chairman developed and presented to the St. Clair County Board an apportionment plan at its Special Meeting on May 10, 2021, and the St. Clair County Board held a public hearing with due notice on the apportionment plan on May 24, 2021;

WHEREAS, the St. Clair County Board desires to adopt this Ordinance approving its Chairman's apportionment plan set forth in 'EXHIBIT A" pursuant to Section 2-3003 of the Illinois Counties Code (55 ILCS 5/2-3003) and providing that, effective December 2012, St. Clair County shall continue to have a County Board Chairman elected by the voters of St. Clair County pursuant to Section 2-3007 of the Illinois Counties Code (55 ILCS 5/2-3007) and twentynine (29) County Board Members elected by county board district from each of the twenty-nine (29) County Board Districts identified in "EXHIBIT A" pursuant to Section 2-3002(a) of the Illinois Counties Code (55 ILCS 5/2-3002(a)), with the terms of such County Board Members to be determined publicly by lot from three (3) groups as provided in Section 2-3009 of the Illinois Counties Code (55 ILCS 5/2-3009).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED that the St. Clair County Board hereby approves its Chairman's apportionment plan set forth in 'EXHIBIT A" pursuant to Section 2-3003 of the Illinois Counties Code (55 ILCS 5/2-3003) and further approves that, effective December 2012, St. Clair County shall continue to have a County Board Chairman elected by the voters of St. Clair County pursuant to Section 2-3007 of the Illinois Counties Code (55 ILCS 5/2-3007) and twenty-nine (29) County Board Members elected by county board district from each of the twenty-nine (29) County Board Districts identified in "EXHIBIT A" pursuant to Section 2-3002(a) of the Illinois Counties Code (55 ILCS 5/2-3002(a)), with the terms of such County Board Members to be determined publicly by lot from three (3) groups as provided in Section 2-3009 of the Illinois Counties Code (55 ILCS 5/2-3009).

SECTION I: INCONSISTENT ORDINANCES REPEALED: All Ordinances or parts of other Ordinances in conflict with the provisions of the Ordinance shall to the extent of the conflict be, and are hereby repealed, provided that nothing herein shall in any way excuse or prevent prosecution of any previous or existing violation of any Ordinance superseded hereby.

SECTION II: SAVING CLAUSE: Nothing in this Ordinance hereby adopted shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding pending in any court, or any rights acquired, or liability incurred, or any cause or causes of action acquired or existing, under any act or ordinance hereby repealed by this Ordinance, nor shall any just or legal right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired or affected by the Ordinance.



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I. THE ENGINEER AGREES,

- To perform or be responsible for the performance of the Scope of Services presented in EXHIBIT A for the LPA inconnection with the proposed improvements herein before described.
- The Classifications of the employees used in the work shall be consistent with the employee classifications and estimated staff
 hours. If higher-salaried personnel of the firm, including the Principal Engineer, perform services that are to be performed by
 tesser-salaried personnel, the wage rate billed for such services shall be commensurate with the payroll rate for the work
 performed.
- 3. That the ENGINEER shall be responsible for the accuracy of the work and shall promptly make necessary revisions or corrections required as a result of the ENGINEER'S error, omissions or negligent acts without additional compensation. Acceptance of work by the LPA or DEPARTMENT will not relieve the ENGINEER of the responsibility to make subsequent correction of any such errors or omissions or the responsibility for clarifying ambiguities.
- That the ENGINEER will comply with applicable Federal laws and regulations, State of Illinois Statutes, and the local laws or ordinances of the LPA.
- 5. To pay its subconsultants for satisfactory performance no later than 30 days from receipt of each payment from the LPA.
- 6. To invoice the LPA, The ENGINEER shall submit all invoices to the LPA within three months of the completion of the work called for in the AGREEMENT or any subsequent Amendment or Supplement.
- 7. The ENGINEER or subconsultant shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin or sex in the performance of this AGREEMENT. The ENGINEER shall carry out applicable requirements of 49 CFR part 26 in the administration of US Department of Transportation (US DOT) assisted contract. Failure by the Engineer to carry out these requirements is a material breach of this AGREEMENT, which may result in the termination of this AGREEMENT or such other remedy as the LPA deems appropriate.
- 8. That none of the services to be furnished by the ENGINEER shall be sublet, assigned or transferred to any other party or parties without written consent of the LPA. The consent to sublet, assign or otherwise transfer any portion of the services to be furnished by the ENGINEER shall be construed to relieve the ENGINEER of any responsibility for the fulfillment of this AGREEMENT.
- 9. For Preliminary Engineering Contracts:
 - (a) To attend meetings and visit the site of the proposed improvement when requested to do so by representatives of the LPA or the DEPARTMENT, as defined in Exhibit A (Scope of Services).
 - (b) That all plans and other documents furnished by the ENGINEER pursuant to the AGREEMENT will be endorsed by the ENGINEER and affixed the ENGINEER's professional seal when such seal is required by law. Such endorsements must be made by a person, duly licensed or registered in the appropriate category by the Department of Professional Regulation of the State of Illinois. It will be the ENGINEER's responsibility to affix the proper seal as required by the Bureau of Local Roads and Streets manual published by the DEPARTMENT.
 - (c) That the ENGINEER is qualified technically and is thoroughly conversant with the design standards and policies applicable for the PROJECT; and that the ENGINEER has sufficient properly trained, organized and experienced personnel to perform the services enumerated in Exhibit A (Scope of Services).
- 10. That the engineering services shall include all equipment, instruments, supplies, transportation and personnel required to perform the duties of the ENGINEER in connection with this AGREEMENT (See Exhibit C).

II. THE LPA AGREES,

- To certify by execution of this AGREEMENT that the selection of the ENGINEER was performed in accordance with the Professional Services Selection Act (50 ILCS 510) (Exhibit D).
- To furnish the ENGINEER all presently available survey data, plans, specifications, and project information.
- 3. To pay the ENGINEER:
 - (a) For progressive payments Upon receipt of monthly invoices from the ENGINEER and the approval thereof by the LPA, monthly payments for the work performed shall be due and payable to the ENGINEER, such payments to be equal to the value of the partially completed work minus all previous partial payments made to the ENGINEER.
 - (b) Final payment Upon approval of the work by the LPA but not later than 60 days after the work is completed and reports have been made and accepted by the LPA and DEPARTMENT a sum of money equal to the basic fee as determined in this AGREEMENT less the total of the amount of partial payments previously paid to the ENGINEER

- 4. In the event that the DEPARTMENT stops payment to the LPA, the LPA may suspend work on the project. If this agreement is suspended by the LPA for more than thirty (30) calendar days, consecutive or in aggregate, over the term of this AGREEMENT, the ENGINEER shall be compensated for all services performed and reimbursable expenses incurred prior to receipt of notice of suspension. In addition, upon the resumption of services the LPA shall compensate the ENGINEER, for expenses incurred as a result of the suspension and resumption of its services, and the ENGINEER's schedule and fees for the remainder of the project shall be equitably adjusted.
- 5. This AGREEMENT shall continue as an open contract and the obligations created herein shall remain in full force and effect until the completion of construction of any phase of professional services performed by others based upon the service provided herein. All obligations of the ENGINEER accepted under this AGREEMENT shall cease if construction or subsequent professional services are not commenced within 5 years after final payment by the LPA.
- 6. That the ENGINEER shall be responsible for any and all damages to property or persons arising out of an error, omission and/or negligent act in the prosecution of the ENGINEER's work and shall indemnify and have harmless the LPA, the DEPARTMENT, and their officers, employees from all suits, claims, actions or damages liabilities, costs or damages of any nature whatsoever resulting there from. These indemnities shall not be limited by the listing of any insurance policy.
- 7. The ENGINEER and LPA certify that their respective firm or agency:
 - (a) has not employed or retained for commission, percentage, brokerage, contingent fee or other considerations, any firm or person (other than a bona fide employee working solely for the LPA or the ENGINEER) to solicit or secure this AGREEMENT.
 - (b) has not agreed, as an express or implied condition for obtaining this AGREEMENT, to employ or retain the services of any firm or person in connection with carrying out the AGREEMENT or
 - (c) has not paid, or agreed to pay any firm, organization or person (other than a bona fide employee working solely for the LPA or the ENGINEER) any fee, contribution, donation or consideration of any kind for, or in connection with, procuring or carrying out the AGREEMENT.
 - (d) that neither the ENGINEER nor the LPA is/are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any Federal department or agency.
 - (e) has not within a three-year period preceding the AGREEMENT been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain or performing a public (Federal, State or local) transaction; violation of Federal or State antitrust statutes or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements or receiving stolen property.
 - (f) are not presently indicated for or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a government entity (Federal, State, or local) with commission of any of the offenses enumerated in paragraph and
 - (g) has not within a three-year period preceding this AGREEMENT had one or more public transaction (Federal, State, local) terminated for cause or default.

Where the ENGINEER or LPA is unable to certify to any of the above statements in this clarification, an explanation shall be attached to this AGREEMENT.

- 8. In the event of delays due to unforeseeable causes beyond the control of and without fault or negligence of the ENGINEER no claim for damages shall be made by either party. Termination of the AGREEMENT or adjustment of the fee for the remaining services may be requested by either party if the overall delay from the unforeseen causes prevents completion of the work within six months after the specified completion date. Examples of unforeseen causes included but are not limited to: acts of God or a public enemy; acts of the LPA, DEPARTMENT, or other approving party not resulting from the ENGINEER's unacceptable services; fire; strikes; and floods.
 - If delays occur due to any cause preventing compliance with the PROJECT SCHEDULE, the ENGINEER shall apply in writing to the LPA for an extension of time. If approved, the PROJECT SCHEDULE shall be revised accordingly.
- 9. This certification is required by the Drug Free Workplace Act (30 ILCS 580). The Drug Free Workplace Act requires that no grantee or contractor shall receive a grant or be considered for the purpose of being awarded a contract for the procurement of any property or service from the DEPARTMENT unless that grantee or contractor will provide a drug free workplace. False certification or violation of the certification may result in sanctions including, but not limited to suspension of contract on grant payments, termination of a contract or grant and debarment of the contracting or grant opportunities with the DEPARTMENT for at least one (1) year but not more than (5) years.

For the purpose of this certification, "grantee" or "Contractor" means a corporation, partnership or an entity with twenty-five (25) or more employees at the time of issuing the grant or a department, division or other unit thereof, directly responsible for the specific performance under contract or grant of \$5,000 or more from the DEPARTMENT, as defined the Act.

The contractor/grantee certifies and agrees that it will provide a drug free workplace by:

- (a) Publishing a statement:
 - (1) Notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession or use of a controlled substance, including cannabis, is prohibited in the grantee's or contractor's workplace.
 - (2) Specifying actions that will be taken against employees for violations of such prohibition.
 - (3) Notifying the employee that, as a condition of employment on such contract or grant, the employeewill:
 - (a) abide by the terms of the statement; and
 - (b) notify the employer of any criminal drug statute conviction for a violation occurring in the workplace no later than (5) days after such conviction.
- (b) Establishing a drug free awareness program to inform employees about:
 - (1) The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;

(2) The grantee's or contractor's policy to maintain a drug free workplace;

(3) Any available drug counseling, rehabilitation and employee assistance program; and

(4) The penalties that may be imposed upon an employee for drug violations.

- (c) Providing a copy of the statement required by subparagraph (a) to each employee engaged in the performance of the contract or grant and to post the statement in a prominent place in the workplace.
- (d) Notifying the contracting, or granting agency within ten (10) days after receiving notice under part (b) of paragraph (1) of subsection (a) above from an employee or otherwise, receiving actual notice of such conviction.
- (e) Imposing a sanction on, or requiring the satisfactory participation in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program.
- (f) Assisting employees in selecting a course of action in the event drug counseling, treatment and rehabilitation required and indicating that a trained referral team is in place.

Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug free workplace through implementation of the Drug Free Workplace Act, the ENGINEER, LPA and the Department agree to meet the PROJECT SCHEDULE outlined in EXHIBIT B. Time is of the essence on this project and the ENGINEER's ability to meet the PROJECT SCHEDULE will be a factor in the LPA selecting the ENGINEER for future projects. The ENGINEER will submit progress reports with each invoice showing work that was completed during the last reporting period and work they expect to accomplish during the following period.

- Due to the physical location of the project, certain work classifications may be subject to the Prevailing Wage Act (820 ILCS 130/0.01 et seq.).
- 11. For Preliminary Engineering Contracts:
 - (a) That tracing, plans, specifications, estimates, maps and other documents prepared by the ENGINEER in accordance with this AGREEMENT shall be delivered to and become the property of the LPA and that basic survey notes, sketches, charts, CADD files, related electronic files, and other data prepared or obtained in accordance with this AGREEMENT shall be made available, upon request to the LPA or to the DEPARTMENT, without restriction or limitation as to their use. Any re-use of these documents without the ENGINEER involvement shall be at the LPA's sole risk and will not impose liability upon the ENGINEER.
 - (b) That all reports, plans, estimates and special provisions furnished by the ENGINEER shall conform to the current Standard Specifications for Road and Bridge Construction, Bureau of Local Roads and Streets Manual or any other applicable requirements of the DEPARTMENT, it being understood that all such furnished documents shall be approved by the LPA and the DEPARTMENT before final acceptance. During the performance of the engineering services herein provided for, the ENGINEER shall be responsible for any loss or damage to the documents herein enumerated while they are in the ENGINEER's possession and any such loss or damage shall be restored at the ENGINEER's expense.

AGREEMENT

This AGREEMENT is entered into effective as of the date of the last party to sign this AGREEMENT, by and between the COUNTY OF ST. CLAIR, ILLINOIS, hereinafter referred to as the "COUNTY" and the ST. CLAIR COUNTY TRANSIT DISTRICT, hereinafter referred to as "SCCTD" (each a "Party" and collectively referred to herein as the "Parties")

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the parties hereto, in order to facilitate the free flow of traffic-while providing for the development of a shared-use pedestrian and bicycle path (hereinafter referred to as the "PROJECT"), St. Clair County Dept. of Roads & Bridges Sec. 21-00276-08-BT; and,

WHEREAS, the Parties hereto are desirous of said Project in that the same will be of immediate benefit to the residents of the county and permanent in nature.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein, the Parties hereto agree as follows:

- It is mutually agreed that the PROJECT will be designed and constructed in accordance with Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) and the American Society of State Highway Transportation Officials (ASSHTO) standards, policies and procedures. SCCTD will operate and maintain the trail.
- The COUNTY will allow SCCTD to construct, operate and maintain the PROJECT on Old Collinsville Road right-of-way, from Lorraine Drive (Sta. 23+00) to Munie Road (Sta. 89+00). This section of trail is known as Old Collinsville Road Trail, Phase 2.
- The SCCTD agrees to make or cause to be prepared the plans and specifications for the PROJECT
 and award the contract to a contractor, prequalified with IDOT pursuant to an open bid process.
 The SCCTD also agrees to acquire right-of- way or easements necessary to complete the
 PROJECT.
- The SCCTD agrees to pay for all the construction costs associated with the improvements as agreed to by the parties.
- The SCCTD agrees to coordinate the PROJECT with the various utility companies and to pay all eligible utility adjustment costs for the entire PROJECT.
- The SCCTD agrees to provide the observation and oversight during construction and cause the improvements to be constructed in accordance with the plans, specifications and contract.

- 7. The SCCTD agrees to own and maintain, or cause to be maintained, the shared-use path, pedestrian ramps, retaining wall, pedestrian handrail, any required drainage appurtenances, fencing, signs, sign posts and beacons constructed as part of the PROJECT.
- 8. SCCTD agrees to maintain the frontslopes and\or backslopes of the roadway embankment from the back of curb or gutter to the right-of-way line. The level of said maintenance shall be at the discretion of the County Engineer, consistent with other like-property of similar use and condition.
- 9. SCCTD will assume all risk and liability of accidents and damages that may accrue to persons or property on account of this work.
- 10. Should the COUNTY's future construction or operations require any temporary removal/replacement, alteration or change of location of the work associated with this PROJECT, said removal/replacement, alteration or change of location shall be made by the SCCTD without expense to the COUNTY.
- 11. This agreement embodies the entire understanding of the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall be binding and inure to the benefits of the parties, their successors and assigns.
- 12. Each party agrees to be responsible for their own actions and indemnify and hold harmless the other party from any liability whatsoever as to the third parties for such actions, including but not limited to personal injury, property damage, court costs, attorney's fees and interest.
- 13. The SCCTD agrees to cause its contractor to provide both property damage and liability insurance for the project. In order to protect the interest of St. Clair County and the Public Building Commission of St. Clair County, the SCCTD agrees that such policies of insurance shall name each of St. Clair County and the Public Building Commission of St. Clair County, IL, as additional insured with all costs to be paid by the Contractor.
- 14. No Party may assign this Agreement without obtaining express, written consent from the other Parties prior to assignment.
- 15. Any controversy or claim, whether based upon contract, statute, tort, fraud, misrepresentation or other legal theory, related directly or indirectly to this Agreement whether between Parties, or any of the Parties' employees, agents or affiliated businesses, will be resolved under the laws of the State of Illinois, in any court of competent jurisdiction in St. Clair County, IL.
- 16. The terms hereof shall not be construed in favor of or against any Party, but shall be construed as if jointly prepared by the Parties, it being understood and agreed that each Party hereto had sufficient opportunity to participate in the drafting of this Agreement and to seek legal advice in relation hereto.
- 17. This writing constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties hereto with respect to the subject matter hereof. It supersedes all prior oral and written understandings, agreements,

representations, and negotiations. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the state of Illinois. This Agreement may be signed in counterparts.

- 18.No waiver by either Party of any default in performance on the part of the other Party, or of any breach or series of breaches, or any of any term, covenant, or condition of this Agreement will constitute a waiver of any subsequent breach or waiver of any term, covenant or condition of this Agreement.
- 19.If any provision of this Agreement shall be held to be void or unenforceable for any reason, said provision shall be deemed modified so as to constitute a provision conforming as nearly as possible to said void or unenforceable provision while still remaining valid and enforceable, and the remaining terms or provisions hereof shall not be affected thereby.
- 20.No modification of this Agreement shall be effective unless in writing and signed by the Parties hereto. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall constitute or be construed to be a partnership or joint venture between the Parties or their respective successors and assigns.
- 21. This Agreement may be executed by facsimile, electronic or original signature of the Parties and in counterparts which, assuming no modification or alteration, shall constitute an original and when taken together, shall constitute one and the same instrument.
- 22. The terms and provisions of Sections 14-21 shall survive the expiration, termination or completion of this Agreement.

AGREEMENT (Highway Construction & Maintenance)

THIS "AGREEMENT" is entered into to be effective as of the _______, day of _______, 2021, by and among the COUNTY OF ST. CLAIR, hereafter "County" or "St. Clair County" and the VILLAGE OF SAUGET, hereafter "Village".

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the Village, in order to ensure safety to the motoring public and to foster economic development of the area, seeks to complete the work described in this Agreement in connection with the improvements to Sauget Business Boulevard as generally depicted in the STP Grant Application Phase I (the "Application"), attached to this Agreement as Exhibit "A"; and,

WHEREAS, the construction and selected contractor for this project will be selected by bid on a future date to be determined; and

WHEREAS, the Village recognizes the County as the inherent owner, all rights and interests conveyed by the "Application" to improve, construct, repair and maintain that portion of the improvements fall under the jurisdiction of St. Clair County; and,

WHEREAS, the County has expressed budgetary concerns with the maintenance of said improvements, thereby the Village has agreed to assist in these maintenance costs by providing future maintenance of newly installed lighting, wiring, guardrails and associated mowing, at Village expense.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein, the Parties hereto agree as follows:

Description of the Improvements. The "Improvements" shall generally consist of: (i) Installation of roadway lighting from the intersection of Goose Lake and Sauget Business Boulevard to the intersection of Curtiss-Steinberg and Sauget Business Boulevard and the installation of approximately 700-800 linear feet of guardrail at identified locations; and , overlay/patching work on the Boulevard, pursuant to the preliminary engineering design work prepared by Weis Design Group, dated the _____ day of ______ , 2021, attached hereto as Exhibit "B" and incorporated herein by reference (the "Design Plan").

1. Construction/Installation of the Improvements.

1.01. Any and all work that is to be performed on St. Clair County right-of-way, shall be done in accordance with the Illinois Department of Transportation ("IDOT") Standard Specifications for Road and Bridge Construction in effect at the time of the letting for the Improvements and/or as shown on the Construction Plans and/or as directed by the County Engineer. This work must be performed by a contractor who is prequalified

with the Illinois Department of Transportation in those categories relevant to the work being done.

- 1.02. Review of Construction Plans. The Village agrees to prepare, or cause to be prepared, the plans and specifications for the Improvements. The County shall cooperate in good faith to provide its approval for roadway access in a reasonably prompt manner, for the Improvements. The Village agrees not to award the contract for the Improvements until said approval is granted. The Village shall obtain any permits, licenses and approvals required for performance of the Improvements work (collectively, the "Approvals"). The County shall cooperate with Village in its efforts to obtain the Approvals to the extent such Party's involvement is required in connection with issuing the Approvals.
- 1.03. <u>Material Testing.</u> Any material that is incorporated into the work must be tested in accordance with procedures set forth by the IDOT by a consultant prequalified with the IDOT under Special Services-Construction Inspection. The results of said testing shall be made available to the County upon request. The cost of said testing shall be borne solely by the Village. Only those materials meeting the standards of the IDOT are to be incorporated into the Improvements.
- 1.04. Temporary Construction Easements. The County agrees to grant and convey, and does hereby grant and convey, to the Village, its employees, agents, contractors, and representatives, a temporary, non-exclusive easement(s) over, upon, across and under those portions of the public rights-of-way and other real property owned or controlled by such Party which are necessary for the construction and completion of the Development for purposes of: (a) ingress and egress to and from the Property and the location where the Development work is ongoing; (b) the installation and construction of any portion of the materials, equipment, or other improvements constituting a part of the Development, as applicable and otherwise facilitating the construction of the improvements and the completion of the Development, as contemplated herein. Upon request, any such temporary easements between Developer and another Party shall be evidenced pursuant to a written temporary construction easement executed by Developer and such Party and in a form reasonably agreeable to the Parties, which may be recorded in the St. Clair County Records upon request of either Party.
- 1.05. Construction Inspector. The Village shall provide a professional engineer registered in the State of Illinois or a consultant prequalified with the IDOT under Special Services Construction Inspection, to oversee the proposed work. The inspections must be in accordance with the IDOT's "Criteria for Outsource Inspector". The Village must provide the name of the individual or firm performing the work, along with documentation of his/her/their past experience, for County approval.

2. Maintenance of the Project.

- 2.01. <u>County's Maintenance</u>. The County shall maintain permanently all improvements lying within the right-of-way of Sauget Business Boulevard with the exceptions set forth below. The degree of maintenance required will be at the sole direction of the County Engineer.
- 2.02. <u>Village Maintenance.</u> The Village agrees to maintain, or cause to be maintained the following:
 - A) All guardrails, constructed as part of this improvement, that are located within St. Clair County right-of-way. This maintenance shall include, but not be limited to: (i) mowing in the area of the guardrails; (ii) maintaining and repairing guardrails as required; and (iii) otherwise keeping the guardrails in a good, safe and clean condition that permits vehicular traffic flow.
 - B) All lighting, wiring, conduit and other appurtenances associated with the proposed street lighting.
 - The degree of maintenance required will be at the sole direction of the County Engineer.
- 2.03. <u>Dedication: No Obligation of Developer.</u> Notwithstanding anything in this Agreement to the contrary, maintenance, repair, and replacement of any and all improvements shall be the obligation of the Village.
- 3. Insurance. The Village agrees to cause its contractor to provide both property damage and liability insurance for the project. In order to protect the interest of St. Clair County and the Public Building Commission of St. Clair County, the Village agrees that such policies of insurance shall name each of St. Clair County and the Public Building Commission of St. Clair County, IL, as additional insured with all costs to be paid by the Village. The Village agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the County for any acts or omissions made by their officers, agents, and/or employees in the construction of the project. The Village shall cause its contractor to comply with the St. Clair County Standard Insurance Certificate Requirements as described on Exhibit "C", attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. The Village shall cause and require continuous workers compensation insurance coverage in amounts no less than required by law by any contractor working, or otherwise using County right-of-way under the temporary construction easement granted herein. Proof of coverage shall be submitted to St. Clair County in like manner to other required certificates of Insurance.
- 4. <u>Notices.</u> All notices, demands or communications required to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing to a Party at its address listed below:

- 5. <u>Default and Remedies.</u> Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, if a Party breaches any provision of this Agreement and fails to remedy such breach within twenty (20) days of notice thereof (unless such cure is not reasonably possible within such 20-day period and the breaching Party has commenced and is pursuing with reasonable diligence such cure), a non-breaching Party may institute legal action against the defaulting Party for specific performance, injunctive or declaratory relief, damages, and/or any other remedy provided by law or in equity. All remedies hereunder shall be deemed cumulative and not exclusive.
- 6. <u>Assignment.</u> No Party may assign this Agreement in whole or in part, nor any right or duty created herein without obtaining express, written consent from the other Parties prior to assignment; This Agreement embodies the entire understanding of the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall be binding upon and inure to the Parties, their respective successors and assigns.
- 7. Governing Law/Venue. Any controversy or claim, whether based upon contract, statute, tort, fraud, misrepresentation, or other legal theory, related directly or indirectly to this Agreement whether between Parties, or any of the Parties' employees, agents or affiliated businesses, or assignees will be resolved under the laws of the State of Illinois, in any court of competent jurisdiction in St. Clair County, IL.
- 8. <u>Interpretation of Agreement.</u> The terms hereof shall not be construed in favor of or against any Party, but shall be construed as if jointly prepared by the Parties, it being understood and agreed that each Party hereto had sufficient opportunity to participate in the drafting of this Agreement and to seek legal advice in relation hereto.
- 9. <u>Complete Agreement</u>. This writing constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties hereto with respect to the subject matter hereof. It supersedes all prior oral and written understandings, agreements, representations, and negotiations.
- 10. <u>Non-Waiver.</u> No waiver by either Party of any default in performance on the part of the other Party, or of any breach or series of breaches, or any of any term, covenant, or condition


of this Agreement will constitute a waiver of any subsequent breach or waiver of any term, covenant or condition of this Agreement.

This Agreement shall be deemed executed on the date of signature by the final counterpart.
- 14. <u>Survivability.</u> The terms and provisions of Sections 6-14 shall survive the expiration, termination, or completion of this Agreement.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Provide a brief description of the purpose of the project and the scope of work. Be as specific as possible.

This project is to be considered Phase 1 of a 3 Phase project to install roadway lighting and guardrails. Due to increases in vehicular accidents and "close calls" reported between vehicles, and vehicles and pedestrians, the Village recognizes the urgent need for improved safety along this heavily traveled roadway. With expanded businesses and jobs in this area, vehicular and pedestrian counts and activity continue to increase. With "shift" work occurring at many of the businesses within the Business Park, and at St. Louis Downtown Airport, vehicular and pedestrian traffic and interaction is always present, and most dangerous throughout the evening and early morning hours. The Business Park is poorly lighted, and in need of improved safety measures at strategic locations along the corridor to protect pedestrians, as well as motorists. Police reports indicate that guardrails are required along the outside edge of roadway curves to protect motorists from leaving the roadway and dropping into the typical roadside swales that exist to serve as stormwater conveyance/storage facilities. Further, police reports and eyewitness accounts have identified numerous close encounters between vehicles and pedestrians walking along the roadway as they leave/arrive at work for a night shift.

This project will install the much-needed roadway lighting to reduce/eliminate the vehicle/pedestrian conflicts, and the guardrails and improved roadway signage will go a long way to protect motorists from leaving the pavement and ending up in the ditches, which are often full with stormwater runoff. The proposed street light spacing is approximately 250 feet, with underground electrical service wiring within PVC conduits.








Steep shoulders and creek at a horizontal curve before a bridge.



Contractor agrees:

1. To procure and maintain for the life of their agreement, insurance coverage conforming to the minimum requirements stated below, and naming St. Clair County, IL and The Public Building Commission of St. Clair County, IL as "Additional Insured" on a primary / noncontributory basis on the Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability policies. These policies as well as the workers compensation policies are to be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation in favor of same.

All policies of insurance shall provide St. Clair County no less than 30 days advance written notice of any material change, cancellation or non-renewal.

All coverages shall be provided by insurance companies authorized to transact business under the law of the State of Illinois, and acceptable to St. Clair County.
