<u>Public Building Commission Meeting Minutes</u> February 15, 2024

Upon a motion by Commissioner Effinger and second by Commissioner Dinges, it was unanimously agreed to approve the Annual Meeting Minutes of January 18, 2024. Motion carried.

Upon a motion by Commissioner Dinges and second by Commissioner Effinger, it was unanimously agreed to approve the Regular Monthly Meeting Minutes of January 18, 2024. Motion carried.

Upon a motion by Commissioner Dinges and second by Commissioner Effinger, it was unanimously agreed to approve the **Regular Expense Claims Report with Payroll Ledger Report** of February 29, 2024. Motion carried.

Upon a motion by Commissioner Dinges and second by Commissioner Effinger, it was unanimously agreed to approve the **Airport Expense Claims Report** of February 29, 2024. Motion carried.

Commissioner Dinges reviewed the **Monthly Budget Analysis Report for February 2024** and stated the Operations and Maintenance 2024 Budget is in line with the projected percentage of 16.7% expenditures.

Commissioner Dinges reviewed the **Trial Balance Report for January 2024** and it can be available when requested in the Public Building Commission Office.

Upon a motion by Commissioner Effinger and second by Commissioner Brown, it was unanimously agreed to approve the Resolution adopting to increase the annual retainer for Attorney Bernard J. Ysursa. Motion carried.

PUBLIC BUILDING COMMISSION OPERATIONS

Upon a motion by Commissioner Effinger and second by Commissioner Dinges, it was unanimously agreed to approve the Adoption of Personnel Codes adopted by County Board in January for PBC employees. Motion carried.

FAIRGROUND OPERATIONS

Upon a motion by Commissioner Effinger and second by Commissioner Bouse, it was unanimously agreed to approve the Millennia Professional Services Proposal in the amount of \$21,480.00. Motion carried.

Upon a motion by Commissioner Brown and second by Commissioner Effinger, it was unanimously agreed to approve the Hurford Architects, Inc. Exhibit 005 not-to-exceed \$585,000.00. Motion carried.

AIRPORT OPERATIONS

Upon a motion by Commissioner Bouse and second by Commissioner Effinger, it was agreed to unanimously approve the Terminal Lease Agreement with General Services Administration. Motion carried.

Upon a motion by Commissioner Effinger and second by Commissioner Brown, it was agreed to unanimously approve the Terminal Lease Agreement Amendment #1 with Holland Construction. Motion carried.

Upon a motion by Commissioner Beach and second by Commissioner Effinger, it was agreed to unanimously approve the Ground Services Amendment #3 with Airport Terminal Services, Inc. The cost is approximately \$305,000.00. Motion carried.

Upon a motion by Commissioner Brown and second by Commissioner Effinger, it was agreed to unanimously approve the Building 8830 (Boeing St. Clair) Emergency HVAC Replacement at a cost of approximately \$98,750.00. Motion carried.

Upon a motion by Commissioner Effinger and second by Commissioner Dinges, it was agreed to unanimously approve the Tree Obstruction Removal Amendment with Horner & Shifrin in the amount not-to-exceed \$27,840.00. Motion carried.

Upon a motion by Commissioner Brown and second by Commissioner Bouse, it was agreed to unanimously approve the Sustainability Management Plan Agreement with WSP, Inc. in the amount of \$334,950.00. The proposed breakdown is \$297,000.00 (FAA) and \$37,950.00 (Local match). Motion carried.

1. Terminal Lease Agreement – General Services Administration

The TSA has provided passenger screening services since 2013 and originally occupied most of the mezzanine level of the terminal building. The initial lease agreement was established between BLV and GSA / TSA to ensure a reasonable amount of space could be used for the purpose of TSA passenger screening. The current lease term expires February 29, 2024. The proposed lease is for a 10-year/5-year firm term. The agreed upon space TSA will occupy is 1,052 square feet.

<u>Financial Impact</u>: The firm term annual rent is estimated at \$46,551.00 and the non-firm term annual rent is estimated at \$48,844.36. Revenue will be used solely for the operations and maintenance of the Airport.

<u>Legal</u>: Legal counsel reviewed the lease proposal and will review the lease prior to execution.

Motion: Authorize the Chair to execute the Terminal Lease Agreement between the Public Building Commission and the General Services Administration when appropriate.



2. Terminal Lease Amendment #1 - Holland Construction, Inc.

Historically, terminal lease space has been limited due to the lack of availability and subsequently due to lack of activity or interest. Recent improvements and additional office space will allow for new opportunities to support a variety of airline and non-airline activities. The original Lease Agreement for approximately 892 sq. ft. was approved by the PBC and commenced in August 2023 and had the initial term through February 29, 2024. The amendment will allow a month-to-month tenancy.

<u>Financial Impact</u>: The lease rate is derived from the 2024 Rate & Charges Schedule and the month-to-month rent will be \$2,861.83. Revenue will be used solely for the operations and maintenance of the Airport.

<u>Legal</u>: Reviewed Amendment #1 and found it to be legally sufficient.

Motion: Authorize the Chair to execute the Terminal Lease Amendment #1 between the Public Building Commission and Holland Construction, Inc.



3. Airport Terminal Services Agreement – Amendment #3

Airport Terminal Services (ATS) has been providing a wide variety of aircraft and air carrier support services for the MidAmerica St. Louis Airport since 2013. ATS services include passenger services, fixed based operator (FBO), aircraft fueling, de-icing services, apron handling, cabin cleaning services, lounge services, and airport ambassador programs. The service provided by ATS is integral to providing high quality goods and services. The 'above' and 'below' wing services provided by ATS will be essential for the airport's continued growth.

<u>Financial Impact</u>: Annual cost for the ATS ground service agreement is approximately \$305,000. Funding for the ATS ground service agreement was included in the FY2024 Airport Budget.

<u>Legal</u>: Reviewed Amendment #3 and found it legally sufficient.

Motion: Authorize the Chair to execute the Ground Services Amendment #3 between the Public Building Commission and Airport Terminal Services, Inc.



4. Building 8830 – Emergency HVAC Replacement

Building 8830 was originally constructed as an Air Cargo Facility in 2005. In 2010, this facility was converted into an aircraft subassembly facility with 8 additional 25-ton RTUs (RTU #2 - #9) providing HVAC for the remainder of the 50,000 SF facility. The airport solicits for and contracts with an HVAC contractor to provide service, inspection, and maintenance for the HVAC at miscellaneous airport buildings. The current contract, BLV Contract 2020-09, is with Integrated Facility Services (IFS). During a recent inspection, IFS found holes in the heat exchangers in RTUs #5 and #7. IFS provided three options for repair: 1) replacement of the heat exchangers (\$25,274 with an 8-week lead time); 2) replacement of the two RTUs with a specified unit (\$96,450 with a 13-week lead time); or 3) replacement of the two RTUs with a comparatively similar in stock Trane unit (\$98,750 with a 0-week lead time). Considering the age of the existing RTUs (~13 years) and the high priority of the project, the airport recommended proceeding with Option 3, replacement of RTUs as expeditiously as possible at a cost of approximately \$98,750. The Airport followed the Illinois PBC Act for procurement in the case of an emergency.

Financial Impact: This project will be paid for out of the Airport Operating Budget.

Motion: The PBC accept this report of emergency procurement for replacement of two Roof Top Units due to the need for continuity of operations in Building 8830.



5. Tree Obstruction Removal - Consultant Agreement Amendment

In June 2021, the PBC approved the selection of Horner & Shifrin, Inc. to complete professional services as necessary to provide environmental, design, construction phase services, and any special services or studies as necessary for a Tree Obstruction Removal project to eliminate these existing and future obstructions. In October 2022, the PBC approved a professional services agreement for \$235,707 for the environmental study associated with the removal of the tree obstructions. Since that time, the environmental assessment has been underway. Upon their initial review, the US Fish and Wildlife Services determined that a Bat Habitat Assessment will be required. This study was not a part of the original scope. As such, Horner & Shifrin, Inc. provided a proposal for \$27,840 to complete the study as a part of the Environmental Assessment.

<u>Financial Impact</u>: The tree obstruction removal project is included in the Airport budget. Federal and State funds will be used for this project.

Motion: Approve Amendment 1 to the engineering agreement with Horner & Shifrin, Inc. for the Tree Obstruction Removal project at a Not to Exceed cost of \$27,840 and authorize the Chairman to execute the agreement when appropriate.



6. Sustainability Management Plan – Agreement

In July 2023, the FAA announced award of a \$297,000 grant to the airport for completion of a Sustainability Management Plan (SMP). At the December 2023 meeting, the PBC approved the selection of WSP, Inc. as the Airport Planning and Environmental Consultant for AIP projects for the period 2024 - 2028. One of the projects identified as part of that solicitation and selection was the subject SMP. The airport has been coordinating with WSP and the FAA on a final scope for the SMP. The total cost of the work will be \$334,950.

<u>Financial Impact</u>: This project is included in the Airport budget. Federal funds will be used for this project. The proposed breakdown is \$297,000 (FAA) + \$37,950 (Local Match) = \$334,950.

<u>Legal</u>: The agreement will be reviewed and approved by PBC legal counsel prior to execution.

Motion: Approve a Professional Services Agreement with WSP, Inc. for the Sustainability Management Plan and authorize the Chairman to execute the agreement when appropriate.



THIRD QUARTER 2023; INCLUDES ILLINOIS, IOWA, AND MISSOURI








MOST MARKETS PERFORM WELL

YEAR ENDED OCTOBER 2023










POTENTIAL US AIR SERVICE NETWORK





YEAR ENDED THIRD QUARTER 2023








ALLEGIANT'S MEXICO TIE-UP ON HOLD




